

DINNER BRINGS CITY PRAISE

WELL ORGANIZED HANDLING OF
DETAILS AND EXCELLENCY
OF SERVICE GENEROUSLY
PRAISED.

Delightful After-Dinner Program
Brings Out Cordial Greeting and
Warm Response From the Visiting
Teachers.

Hundred per cent efficient is the verdict passed by several hundred upon La Grande's domestic science department after that branch of La Grande's schools served a luncheon at 6:30 last evening at the high school gymnasium to visiting teachers, presidents of various civic, literary and commercial organizations of the city and several special guests. Under the direction of Miss Kirtley, domestic science instructor, and ably assisted by grade teachers as lieutenants, the various courses were set before the diners with perfect dispatch and decorum. The army of waiters was directed with commendable precision.

After the service three short post-prandial speeches were heard. Toastmaster McCullough calling first on Bruce Dennis to welcome the teachers for the Commercial club, the Neighborhood club and the city generally. In his address Mr. Dennis cited the tendencies of the times—parents, over-absorbed in social affairs and business, throw the burden of influencing and educating their own children upon the school teacher. He pointed to the sacrifices the rural teacher pays, and swinging over to a lighter vein of talk urged the teachers to ring up Superintendent Bollins of the O.W. and be escorted by him through the shops; to call George Palmer to visit the sawmill, and to visit department stores; in short, if the teachers want an automobile ride, if they want anything in fact, just "point and it will be brought unto you." A demonstration broke out when he made reference to Mr. Hughes' chances for election next Tuesday. His cleverly couched compliment to the ages of school teachers reminded the diners that teachers on the whole are younger now than formerly.

A. C. Strange, superintendent of schools in Baker responded in well chosen words. With applicable stories he brought his audience to know some of the joys that commingle with pain and pathos along the teacher's route. He spoke of La Grande's noticeable hospitality. He voiced the sentiment that indulgent parents often undo at home that which the teacher strives to accomplish.

His address beamed with beautiful thoughts and gracious sentiment. Mrs. Ray W. Logan cordially invited the teachers to attend a dance and reception this evening at Rex hall for the visiting teachers, extended the welcoming hand as president of the Neighborhood club which is sponsor for the reception.

With Mrs. Logan's well worded but brief speech, the assembly adjourned to the auditorium where Edward O. Sisson addressed the visitors.

The Votes Which Count

Inasmuch as the next President will be elected by electoral votes and not by oratory, it is worth while examining the summary of the electoral college situation as printed in the Tribune of Sunday. Briefly, it shows that of the 531 votes in the electoral college 210 may be counted as safely for Hughes and 149 safely for Wilson. There are 172 not fully certain.

The winner must have 266 votes. Wilson to win must, then, obtain 117 of these uncertain votes; Hughes needs only 56 of them. The odds would seem to be easily with Hughes.

New York has 45 electoral college votes and New Jersey has 14. It is hard to see how Wilson could have been repudiated much more heartily than in these two eastern states. Their votes alone, if the estimate is correct, would be enough to elect Mr. Hughes. Among the other so-called uncertain states are Ohio with 24 votes, Indiana with 15, Wisconsin with 13, and Missouri with 18. In all four Mr. Hughes is strong.

The count of the electoral college is extremely favorable for a great Republican victory. And it is the electoral college which will elect the President—not "straw votes" or Democratic oratory.—Chicago Tribune.
