Sporting News

Ed Houck, the deaf mute who returned a few days ago from a prolonged stay in Joseph, set a high water mark on the Roesch bowling alleys last night, going 298 one game, 223 another and 278 the third making a total of 799 for the three games. For a time it appeared that he would go for a perfect score on the Roesch alley the same as he did on the Club alleys last winter, but a two-pin discrepancy developed. The total for the three games is remarkable.

The statement in one of the Portland papers recently to the effect that the waterfowl season does not close in certain counties in Oregon until February 15, and in Clatsop an additional open season from March 1 to April 30, and in Coos county from December 31 to January 31, is entirely erroneous, and misleading.

The Federal Migratory Bird law does not permit shooting of geese, brant, wild ducks, coots, gallinules, and jacksnipe after sunset January 15 throughout Oregon and Washington.

Black-breasted and golden plover and the greater and lesser yellowlegs open season closes December 15 throughout Oregon and Washington.

A closed season extends throughout the United States until September 1, 1918, on the following migratory game birds: Band-tailed pigeons, little brown, sandhill, and whistling cranes, wood ducks, swans, curlew, willet, and all shore birds except the black-breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jacksnipe, woodcock, and the greater and lesser yellowlegs.

All shooting of migratory game birds is prohibited between sunset and sunrise throughout the United States.

Insectivorous birds are protected indefinitely.

A State date governs when it opens the season later or closes it earlier than the Federal Regulations if the State game authorities so order and not conflict with the Federal law.

If you will kindly give the above information due prominence in your paper it may be the means of keeping innocent sportsmen out of serious trouble with the Federal authorities.

All But Two Dodgers to Get New Contracts.

New York, Nov. 2.—(United Press Staff Correspondent)—Jack Daubert and Jack Coombs are the only members of the Brooklyn National league champions who will not have to sign the papers again if they are members of the Dodgers when the 1917 flag chase starts. And, if Wilbert Robinson has anything to do with it, there are a few of the other Dodgers who will be homeless. Nap Rucker, veteran of many a campaign and for a long time the only asset of the Dodgers, is one of the many who has run out of his term with the Brooklyn.

Nap may be back and he may not—Robinson doesn't say. Robinson declared when he left for his home in Baltimore that there were weak points in his club which must be strengthened if the team is to make any kind of a showing next year, and it is more than probable that a couple of

these changes will come in the infield. Ivan Olson, despite his determination and his fighting spirit, seems booked for a new berth, and the same might be said of George Cutshaw, for George undoubtedly "cracked under the strain" in the world's series. Cutshaw's slip-up probably will get attention, if for no other reason than its moral effect on the Dodgers. The outfield is destined to have at least one new performer. There are many who do not consider Jimmy Johnston of big league caliber and he probably will surrender his job to Hi Meyers. There are several recruits who are expected to have the call over Johnston.

Lessen Waste in Marketing Perishables.

Chicago, Nov. 2.—(United Press)—Soaring prices may get a solar plexus jab when the National Conference on Marketing and Farm Credits meet here December 4 to 9. Efforts to stop waste in marketing of livestock, milk, grain and perishable food stuffs will be made and proposed laws supplementing the Federal Farm Loan Act will be drawn up. This is to be the fourth conference of the national association which is devoted to the problem of cutting down waste of all kinds in distribution of farm products. It is attempting to bring the farmer and the consumer closer together hoping that both may profit by eliminating middlemen.

London, Nov. 1.—(United Press)—Latest dispatches have indicated five Americans are missing from the Maracaibo. They are Daniel Thomas, Josh Brown, George Sedbury, House and Brown the first names of the last two being unknown.

AGED MOTHER IN DUBLIN PASSES

J. H. Pearce has received the following newspaper clipping from Dublin, giving an account of the death and funeral of his mother, about which he had previously been advised:

Death of Mrs. Pearce, Carrick-On-Suir.

The death of Mrs. Pearce, widow of the late Mr. William Loftus Pearce, of Ballycastlane House, Carrick-on-Suir, and mother of Mr. W. F. Pearce, of W. F. Pearce, Ltd., motor engineers, Catherine street, Waterford, took place early on Saturday morning, August 26 at 58 Shelbourne road, Ballsbridge, Dublin, where she had been residing for some years. For a considerable time before her demise her health had been rapidly failing, and, despite all that could be done, she passed away at the advanced age of 83 years. The deceased lady was a resident for the greater part of her life in Carrick-on-Suir, where her kind disposition won for her much esteem. She was a daughter of the late Rev. George Irwin, Bandon, and was pre-deceased by her husband twenty years ago.

The funeral took place on Monday. The remains were conveyed to Carrick-on-Suir by rail, and on arrival were met by a very large number of people, many of whom traveled long distances. The remains were interred in the Protestant graveyard, after a short and impressive service in the church and at the graveside. The Rev. A. H. Cooke, M. A., Rector, officiated.

Cinnamon Apples.
Peel, core and quarter six good cooking apples, tart. Melt a tablespoon of butter in a warm bowl and stir apples in it until coated with butter. Mix 1 tablespoon of ground cinnamon with 1-2 cup sugar and stir into apples. Put apples in well-buttered paper bag. Rinse the bowl with one cup hot water and add to apples, seal bag carefully and place on a broiler which rests on a pie plate and bake in a hot oven 15 minutes. Half a pint of whipped cream over the apples when served is a good addition, but the apples will be found delicious without it.
