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Whitman who has a charming personality and an adorable character, all of which "Toby" Niles, his former pupil, will attest, spoke on "The Transient and Permanent in Education."

He said in part: "We need to recognize that rules, text books and courses of study should be used so long as they serve their purpose and no longer for there is a transient element in education."

"A community is responsible for its schools—not alone for its finances but for what goes on within the schools. More and more there is being emphasized the social side of the school and the fact that the school should be a social center not alone for the boys and girls but also for the fathers and mothers."

"The need of the schools today is for the teacher who can get into the heart of the life of the boy and girl."

Miss Hindman Plays
The audience was edified and entertained at the after-dinner session last night. Miss Cecile Hindman playing "Polonaise in E Major" (Liszt) and "Butterfly" (Grieg) as an encore, demonstrated her great technique and skill as a pianist, stamping her as unusually fit for so important a post in school life.

Deborah Smith's function in the La Grande school is to teach English but God gave her a most delightful voice and she never fails to be generous with it—hence her number "My Heart At Thy Sweet Voice" (Saint Saens) and "Yo San" (Fincken) as an encore, were most vociferously applauded.

Evening Address Given
The main address of the evening followed. Edward O. Sisson of Idaho was the speaker and he chose "Parliament Issues in Education" as a theme. He said in part:

"Education in United States costs about \$750,000,000 but about 100,000,000 are concerned. Large as this figure may seem, it seems smaller when we consider that we spend millions for intoxicants and a million for tobacco—practically four dollars for these two items for each one spent for education."

"The children after all are the chief investors for they are investing all they have—their time. There is another great investment, that must be made in education and that is the investment of interest. Americans do take greater interest now than ever before. European nations have schools because the government demands them; in America the people demand them."

"The paramount issue is what our children are doing in these schools and what they are getting out of them."

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"In the past we asked if a certain thing in school was a good thing. Now the question to be asked if a certain thing is the best thing."

"Formerly we were ruled by the system, now more and more we are being influenced, not by the system, but by the demands of life."

"There are several directions which we will be compelled to move in:

First—More than one year's work in natural science.

"Second—A larger and richer study of the relation between man and man—that is, social sciences. This is probably the most important phase in the school life of a democracy."

"Third—Advance in vocational training. These three lines converge into the one great line of character building."

The departmental work this morning was changed considerably from the program arrangement. H. C. Seymour, of the O. A. C. extension department took his theme "Boys and Girls' Industrial Club" from the scheduled Advanced department to the Rural department and E. D. Ressler went from the Rural to the Advanced department taking the theme "Thrift". Both of these speakers were much enjoyed.

M. S. Pittman took the intermediate department this morning and Miss Fox was unusually interesting in the intermediate primary department. State Superintendent Churchill addressed the high school department which developed into a general discussion with a fireworks of questions and answers.

The afternoon departmental work was likewise interesting. Mr. Pittman took the Rural department; Miss Fox the Primary; Mr. Seymour the Intermediate; Mr. Churchill the Advanced; Mr. De Busk the High School.

Some of the very best work of the institute is done in these departmental studies.

Umatilla Teachers Meet.

Pendleton, Nov. 2.—(Special)—The teachers' institute opened yesterday morning with the attendance that had been expected and with all the speakers on hand, and with every promise of being an instrument of no little aid to the instructors of the county. The speakers on the program yesterday were Mrs. M. L. Fulkerson of Salem, Superintendent J. A. Churchill, County Librarian Sabra L. Nason, J. G. Kilpatrick of the Children's Aid Society, J. C. Herbsman, E. J. Klemme.

At four o'clock yesterday afternoon there was a demonstration of the care of the school library by the members of the staff of the county library.

Last evening the teachers were guests at the concert of the Kukuku Hawaiian quintet, here under the auspices of the High School Lyceum course.
