## ORGANIZATION OF COUNTY COUNCIL IS PERFECTED

"The object of the County Council is to act in an advisory capacity to the County Agriculturist. This fact must be apparent to all, that the views of a dozen or more progressive farmers representing all parts of the county, are more valuable than that of any one of them as to the most important problems of the county. The fact that we have local problems may not be apparent to those who have not given the matter serious thought. The ills of Agriculture the same as those of human beings can not be cured or properly cared for if the individual case is not taken into consideration. Blanket prescriptions will not do, because potatoes are sprayed in New York and the potato crop saved does not mean that we must do like wise. Sudan Grass is a great crop in the Southwest but it does not mean that it will thrive under field conditions here. Parts of our county can grow tomatoes, other parts can barely grow potatoes; some of us can mature corn each year, others can only grow it for fodder. Silos are used extensively where corn is largely grown. Under your conditions you may not be able to grow corn, so you say that you have no use for a silo. Yes we have local problems and by getting together we are better able to determine our local and county troubles. Further, by getting together, we determine which are our important and which are our minor problems and together we plan our methods of solving our county questions.

"Also when questions arise or a condition exists upon which the County Agriculturists is uncertain as to the best method of procedure, a meeting of the Council may be called and some definite action taken. In other words the farmers of the county can direct the lines along which they wish work done in an Agricultural way by the County Agriculturist.

"Thursday October 26 the first meeting of the County Council was held in the County Agriculturists office in the Federal building. This meeting was merely preliminary to the first annual meeting to be held in December. Mr C. D. Huffman was elected temporary chairman, Mr. Bernal Hug of Elgin temporary secretary. The following constitution

### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS FOR COUNTY AGRICULTURAL COUNCIL.

**Art. I. Name.**  
The name of this organization shall be the Union County Agricultural Council.

**Art. II. Purpose.**  
It shall be the purpose of the Council to co-operate with the Oregon Agricultural College and the United States Department of Agriculture in outlining the work and maintaining the office of the County Agricultural Agent, and in general, to promote the agricultural welfare of the county.

**Art. III. Membership.**  
The membership of this council shall consist of the following:—One representative from each of the agricultural organizations of the county (such as granges, farmers' unions, growers' associations, breeders' associations, improvement clubs, etc.) which shall, by the election of a representative to the Council, indicate its desire to co-operate for the above stated purposes; one member of the board of county commissioners, appointed by that body; members of the board of regents of the Oregon Agricultural College and the State Horticultural commissioners living within the county; three members at large, representing the unorganized farmers of the county and appointed by the board of county commissioners from a list of ten farmers nominated by the County Agricultural Agent.

**Art. IV. Term of Office.**  
After the organization of the council the members shall draw lots and those receiving even numbers shall hold office for two years and those receiving odd numbers shall hold office for one year, but after the first year all members of the council shall hold office for two years and the term of half of the council shall expire each year. The secretary shall draw lots for absent members and notify them as to whether their first election is for one or two years. Vacancies in the council may be filled at any time in the same manner in which the retiring representatives received his election.

**Art. V. Officers.**  
The officers of the council shall consist of a president, vice president and secretary treasurer, elected by

ballot for one year or until successors are duly elected at the regular annual meeting. The duties shall be those usually assigned to such officers.

**Art. VI. Executive Committees.**  
The above named officers of the council and two additional members appointed by the president from the council at large, shall constitute an executive committee which shall have authority to transact such business as the council may direct and shall hold office for one year or until successors are elected and appointed.

**Art. VII. Additional Committees.**  
The president of the council shall appoint from the council at large a committee of three for each of the projects which the County Agricultural Agent may have upon his program of work and may appoint additional committees as the need may develop. The president of the council and the County Agricultural Agent shall be ex-officio members of each committee.

**Art. VIII. Meetings.**  
The meetings of the council, with the exception of the annual meeting shall be held at the call of the president and the president shall be required to call a meeting upon request signed by five members of the council.

An annual meeting of the council shall be held on a day in December fixed by the executive committee and at least one month prior to the date of the annual meeting, the secretary shall send or cause to have sent to each of the farmers' organizations of the county an announcement of the annual meeting and shall request those whose representatives retire from the council, to elect successor for the ensuing two years, who shall be present at the annual meeting and participate in the annual election of officers.

**Art. IX. Reports of Organizations.**  
It shall be the duty of each member of the Agricultural council to report to the organization which he represents, at its regular meetings, regarding the progress of the work being carried on by the council through the Agricultural Agent and otherwise.

**Art. X. Order of Business.**  
The order of business in the meetings of the council shall be as follows:  
1. Call to order by the president.  
2. Reading the minutes of the previous meetings.  
3. Reports of committees.  
4. Unfinished business.  
5. Reports by representatives of organizations on Council work done by organization.  
6. Reports or recommendations of the County Agricultural Agent or State leader.

7. Suggestions for the improvement of the council.  
8. New business.  
9. Adjournment.

**Art. XI. Quorum.**  
One third or more of the council members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

**Art. XII. Amendments.**  
This constitution and by-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting at which a quorum is present.

**Addition to Art. III.**  
When a regularly elected representative of the council is unable to attend a meeting, he may send a substitute in his stead, who upon the vote of approval by the council may have all the privileges of a regular council member.

### Appeal for Poland.

New York, Nov. 8.—(Special)—Monday, Nov. 6 a memorial regarding Polish Relief was presented to the President at Shadow Lawn by Rev. Charles S. Macfarland, General Secretary of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, and Mr. Ignace J. Paderewski.

The memorial which has been signed by representatives of the Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish faiths is as follows:

The President of the United States, Executive Offices, Asbury Park, New Jersey, Sir:—Your petitioners learn, with deep regret, that satisfactory arrangements have not yet been secured with the European powers, whereby the people of America may render, out of their abundance, adequate assistance to the suffering peoples of Poland.

We express our grateful recognition of the earnest appeal which you made in behalf of our brothers and sisters in this devastated region, as well as your recent efforts to open the doors for the fullest relief for these innocent sufferers.

While the appalling need of these people is so great, we believe that the relief as yet offered by the American people has been sadly incommensurate, in part because of the difficulty in conveying help.

While it is possible now for the American people to transmit money, we believe that gifts would be incomparably increased by this means as well as by others, if the opportunity for rendering all kinds of assistance were made possible.

The American people honor the memory of Kosciuszko, Pulaski, and other names which are dear to our hearts, and all that we can do is but the paying of a debt which we owe rather than an expression of philanthropy. We, therefore, desire the fullest opportunity for rendering this recompense to a people whose history is one of brave suffering.

We believe that we express the feelings and utter the voice of the great bodies of American people with which we are connected, and of all the people, in urging that in every legitimate way, you seek to resume and continue your good offices with the government of Europe, in the effort to obtain access for the help which we believe our people may yet be persuaded to render.
