Inspection of Apples.

Walla Walla, Nov. 9.—(Special)—According to a telegraphic dispatch to Paul H. Weyrauch, President of The Fruit Growers Agency Inc., the Federal Office of Markets is to inaugurate a very important inspection service on apples at the receiving end. Mr. C. T. More, who has recently visited the leading fruit districts of the Northwest with this new service in view, is to be stationed at Fort Worth and Dallas, Texas, to supervise this inspection service.

The Office of Markets, thru the cooperation of shippers and railroads plans to inspect cars of apples which pass thru Fort Worth and Dallas. As these two places are division points on a number of leading southern railroads, the service will cover fruit distributed over a large territory.

Inspection service on fruit going to Texas and tributary territory is especially important because shippers have hitherto been at the mercy of the buyer in these markets.

Texas is so far distant from other large fruit markets that fruit which is rejected for any reason by a buyer there cannot well be diverted and hence must often be disposed of at a considerable loss. With Government inspection the shipper will have authoritative information as to the condition of his fruit and can deal with the buyer accordingly.

The Fruit Growers Agency has been working for this inspection service for some time and hopes ultimately to secure a service which will minimize the shippers risk with unscrupulous buyers on a declining market.

An advisory Board has just been appointed by the Governors of the states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho for the purpose of considering a cooperative plan for marketing the fruit products of these states.

Governor Lister's appointees are as follows: Captain Paul H. Weyrauch, President of The Fruit Growers Agency, Inc., Mr. Gordon C. Corbaley, Managing Secretary, Spokane Chamber of Commerce, and Mr. T. O. Morrison, Assistant Commissioner of Agriculture, Division of Horticulture, Olympia.

Governor Alexander's appointees to the committee are Mr. Gottfried Lohrli, of Pomeroy, Idaho, Mr. W. N. Yost, of Meriden, Idaho and Mr. S. J. Klepper, of Rathbun, Idaho.

Governor Withycombe's appointees are Professor C. I. Lewis, Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oregon, Mr. A. C. Allen, Medford, Oregon, and Dr. C. A. Macrum of Portland, Oregon.

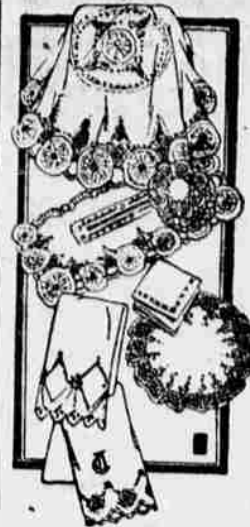
