

FORESEE CHANGE

Rome, Oct. 23.—(By Mail)—In Germany a Jesuit, Rev. Franz Ehrle, recently wrote an article, proposing a possible solution of "the Roman question." He suggested that the Papacy be given the "proprietorship" not the mere "occupancy" of the Vatican properties, as now. In local clerical circles the suggestion is viewed as highly significant. It may be Pope Benedict's plan for destroying the historic differences between the Italian government and the Holy See,—some say. Others, however, declare that, if anything, it is only a papal balloon, sent up to see in what direction the wind's blowing. That the pope will be represental at the peace conference is the prevailing opinion here. Father Ehrle is no stranger to the Papacy's affairs. Like the present pope, with whom he is said to be very friendly, he belongs to Rampolla's diplomatic school. In Lee's time he had great influence as the Vatican librarian. He was later appointed to an important post in the Biological institute here. His character is the first definite evidence of settlement, proposed in late years by a recognized clergyman. His long and successful career in the papal curia has long ago forbade all such irregular proposals, it is said. Before the war only general discussions of the subject were officially permitted. Under the present law of guarantees the Holy Father is only permitted to occupy the Vatican properties, the Jesuit writes. If the Italian government would substitute "proprietorship" for "occupancy", he would implicitly become sovereign and independent, he maintains. Italy's fundamental law would have to be changed to permit this substitution. Foreign powers, being necessarily notified of this change, would be indirectly but officially informed of the Holy See's sovereignty. All international debate on the question would thereby be obviated, Father Ehrle concludes. Several other possible solutions have come from less informed sources. One suggests that the Holy Father be given Trent as a place to reestablish the papacy. Although in Australian hands, Italy calls the present battlefield region its "redeemed lands." Under such an arrangement an archbishop would rule the Roman diocese and the pope would again be seen abroad. This suggestion however, is not taken very seriously.

Another would grant him the Leonine City. This would embrace a portion of Rome, in the Trestevere district, a strip of land, reaching to the sea. A seaport town, probably also would be included. This just now provokes far more energetic and popular opposition on the part of the Italians than Father Ehrle's.

Fear Coal Shortage in Northwest
Duluth, Minn., Nov. 9.—(United Press)—Coal men here today abandoned all hope that the present reserve of coal would supply the Northwest's demand for the coming winter. Ports here and Superior furnish nearly all the Northwest's coal. Their admission of their inability to get sufficient coal while navigation was open is fair evidence that there will be a coal shortage this winter when themometers register around 60 below zero.

OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

Peppers Stuffed.
Cut off the stems and remove the seeds of six green peppers, and then parboil them. Heat a frying pan and melt in it two tablespoonsful of butter. Next add one chopped onion. Let this cook slowly for fifteen minutes, then stir in four tablespoonsful of bread crumbs and season with pepper, catchup and salt. When the peppers are removed from the boiling water set them up in a shallow pan like cups and put one tablespoonful of the mixture into each, covering again with some more of the prepared crumbs. If the eggs are liked soft bake for ten minutes only, but if liked hard bake for fifteen minutes. They should be served on toast with one and one-half cupsful of white sauce, into which have been mixed two tablespoonsful of mild grated cheese.

Apple Rice Pudding.
Pare and core one-half dozen apples and place them in a well buttered pudding dish; cook one cup of rice and salt slightly. When rice is beginning to soften take the fire. Into the core opening put enough rice to half fill, then a piece of butter and finish filling. Put rice all around and over the apples until they are smothered. Sprinkle two tablespoonsful of sugar with a little cinnamon over the whole. Have ready one pint of milk heated and pour over the rice. Bake in the oven till the milk is all cooked up. Serve with cream or maple sugar.

Kimono Nightgowns.
A kimono nightgown is the most simple to make and can readily be fashioned with out a pattern. Fold the crepe crosswise in the center (three yards of material will be sufficient) and cut a square or circular neck in the middle of the fold. Cut out a triangular piece nine inches from the fold, thus forming short sleeves. This piece is not wasted, but sewed to the bottom of the skirt as a gore. Make French seams, face the neck and sleeves and the gown is ready for a bit of trimming. Beading and lace around the neck and sleeves with a narrow ribbon for a draw string is all that is necessary. A flowered crepe with colored ribbon to match will make a pretty gown, and the actual work of making it can be accomplished in a very short time.

Place pieces of flannel or blotter between fine china plates. This will prevent them being scratched.

Lamb Stuffed With Spinach—Remove stalks and stale leaves from a quart of fresh spinach, thoroughly wash and plunge in a quart of boiling water with a teaspoonful salt for 10 minutes, thoroughly drain on sieve, completely press out all water with the hands and finely chop. Place in a small saucepan with 2 egg yolks, half teaspoonful salt, three saltspoons white pepper, half teaspoon sugar and one salt spoon grated nutmeg. Place pan on fire, sharply stir with wooden spoon while heating for five minutes, remove, keep on a table; carefully bone a shoulder of lamb, season with a teaspoon salt, half teaspoon white pepper and a pinch of nutmeg. Spread spinach on inside part of shoulder of lamb, neatly fold up and tie all around. Place on rack in roasting tin. Then pour half gill of water in the pan. Spread a tablespoon of melted lard over the top of lamb, set to roast in

oven 50 minutes, turning frequently basting. Remove, unite, dress on a large hot platter, skim fat from surface of gravy in pan, pour in one gill of demiglace, boil five minutes, strain sauce over lamb and serve.

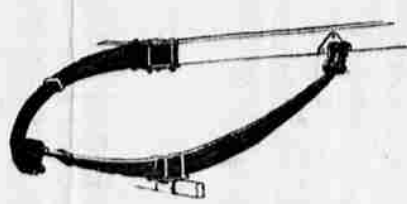

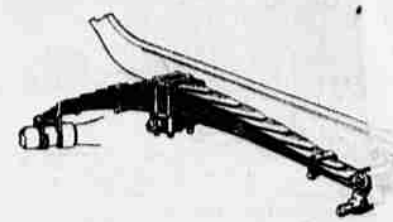
