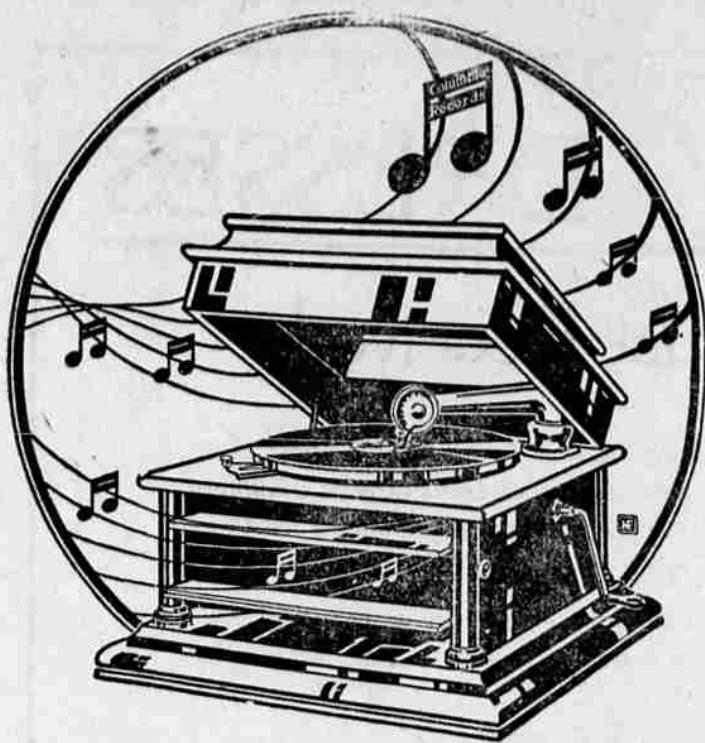

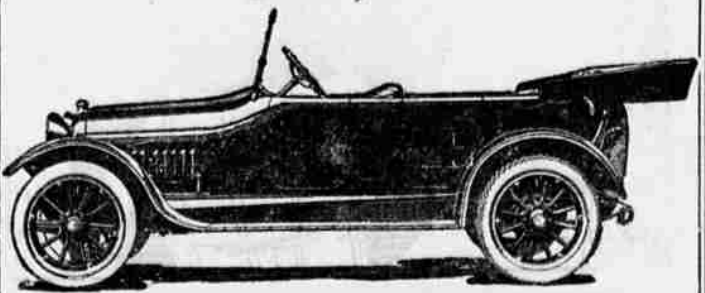

NEXT LYCEUM DATE ON FRIDAY

Chicago Author and Lecturer Will Be Attraction in La Grande—Well recommended.

Dr. James S. Kirtley, Chicago, who has written a very interesting book entitled "That Boy of Yours," and who for years has made a study of the boy and his needs, is to lecture in the high school auditorium next Friday evening Nov. 17th, as the third number of the Y. M. C. A.—High School Lyceum course.

The subject of his lecture will be "The Barefoot Kingdom."

Dr. Kirtley, however, is not only an author and an authority on a subject of vital interest and importance, but he is also a most fluent speaker.

Dr. A. K. de Blois of Boston has well described this lecture on "The Barefoot Kingdom" when he said: "It sparkled with rare wit. It charmed by its beauty of imagery. Above all it was thought-provoking and life-inspiring."

The metropolitan papers have reviewed Dr. Kirtley's book most favorably, among them the New York Times, New York Examiner, Chicago Herald, Chicago Tribune; also such journals as The Chicago Advance, the Baptist World of Louisville, the Biblical World and The Survey. The Review of Reviews pronounces this book particularly suggestive and entertaining, and Bishop Quayle said to Dr. Kirtley: "You have done boyhood and the parents of boys a distinct service."

Perhaps it would be more accurate to say that Dr. Kirtley's hobby in general is People, and he specializes on Delmar Avenue Baptist Church in St. Louis. As the bachelor pastor of the Louis, he had a Boys' Brigade, when that movement was at its height. Every Thursday evening he gave up to the boys. In the summer he took them out camping.

Dr. Kirtley's first lecture, except for a few talks on temperance in very early days, was on "That Boy of Yours," a lecture prepared and delivered on a trip to his former pastorate in Versailles, Ky., where the people had requested and kept on requesting that he give them a lecture. The lecture was later rebuilt under the title "In the Barefoot Kingdom." It has been given nearly two hundred times at Chautauquas and in lyceum courses.

How to Cook Sausage.

Frankfurt Sausages—Boil six sausages for 15 minutes, cool, remove the skins, cut into small pieces. Melt three tablespoons butter, add three tablespoons flour and add three-quarters of a cup each of milk and cream. Add the sausages, season with salt, pepper and cayenne, let the mixture come to hot boiling point, and serve.

Will "Give Germany A Republic When She Is Driven Back To The Rhine."

New York, Nov. 11.—A poll on the French front not long ago told President Poincaré that when the Allies have pushed the Germans back to the Rhine they will "give the German people a republic."

In the East today is a very husky, very earnest, very intense Frenchman with a close-cropped van Dyke beard who is preparing to travel all over the United States and explain that remark.

M. Jules Bois, the man, is a special envoy of the French government to the United States. His task is to explain the difference, as he sees it, between the French and German culture. He said today that the poll's remark was the result of his mental schooling in French culture—"a feminine culture based upon love, not a masculine culture based upon conquest."

The teaching of the French culture is as important a part of the training of fighting men in the armories of France," said M. Bois, "as is the military drill. I do not know that this is true in your United States, but it might well be."

"The poll's remark epitomized the spirit of French culture. Along with his bayonet and gun he got the idea that he could not use either in attack, but only in honorable defence."
