

2 COUNTIES ENJOY FOOTBALL

Enterprise, Joseph, Lostine, Wallowa, Elgin and La Grande Boost Elevens.

Union and Wallowa counties are intensely interested in football at the present writing. This afternoon the Wallowa team is playing at Elgin, a team she defeated two to 0 early in the season. Elgin held a big rally Thursday night to work up enthusiasm for the game and the Elginites really hope to win. Elgin is booked to come to La Grande a week from today.

Over at Enterprise football is holding strong sway.

The E. H. S. football team has won two decided victories. The Lostine team came to Enterprise Saturday and was defeated by a score of 52 to 0. The contestants were about evenly matched in weight but Lostine's team work was inferior to that of Enterprise. They played a clean, hard game to the last minute.

Enterprise went to Joseph Tuesday afternoon, school having been opened at eight o'clock and the day's entire schedule gone through by 12:15. It was a disagreeable day for a game with two inches of snow on the field and it was naturally rather slow. Neither team played good ball. Joseph held their opponents for a time but they failed to make their passes good. Their line plays were equal in force to those of Enterprise. They were far stronger than was expected, as they were defeated by Lostine. Their next game with Lostine is going to be quite interesting.

Teach Manual Training.

Corvallis, Ore. Nov. 11.—(Special)—"I know a crippled manual training pupil who has altered the kitchen, replumbed the house and made several pieces of furniture," said Prof. E. D. Ressler, Professor of Industrial Education at the Oregon Agricultural College in an address to the Education

Club of the college recently. About 175 prospective teachers were present. Prof. Ressler is devoting his time this year to extensio tours. He is studying conditions with the object of better adapting courses to state needs. Popular recognition of its value, he stated, is creating a growing demand for industrial education.

"Industrial subjects lend themselves easily to social service," said Professor. He strongly emphasized the demand for teachers prepared to lead in community welfare.

There are at present 350 special teachers in Oregon, and fully 10 more are needed every year. There have been 106 students of the Oregon Agricultural College appointed to teaching positions this year. The demand manual training teachers could not be supplied. During the year 1916-17 the services of these teachers will be worth \$86,000. Appointees will teach in 28 of the 35 counties of Oregon, and in six other states. Of the 83 employed in this state, 23, or a little more than one fourth, have positions in ten East Oregon counties, four of whom are in Union County.

Agnes Johnson of Corvallis is teaching home economics in Union, Naomi Kirtley of La Grande is teaching home economics in La Grande, H. W. Mason, of Ione, is teaching manual training in La Grande, and Myra Wigglesworth of Union is teaching commerce in Union. It will be noted that two of the four are employed at home.

If the Smith-Hewes bill is passed by Congress Prof. Ressler believes that industrial education will be greatly stimulated. This bill provides that the national government support vocational high schools similar in nature to the agricultural colleges. Oregon will be offered \$150,000 provided she appropriates a like amount. The bill has passed the Senate and if the House be favorable will go into effect in 1917.

Home Coming Day November 25

Oregon Agricultural College Corvallis, Oregon, Nov. 11.—(Special)—Old graduates, former students and friends of the College throughout the state are planning to return to the College for home coming day on the date game November 25, and a special program for this event will begin Friday evening with a monster rally to be held on the campus, and will conclude Sunday afternoon with a visit to the club houses and fraternities, which will hold a special reception for former students and friends.

The exercise of home coming day will be conducted by committees of the student body. Tentative plans for a call for a rally at the burning of the huge bonfire on Friday evening. On Saturday morning the program of field sport will be arranged in which the college stars in various events will participate. On Saturday afternoon the big game, which is the football classic of the year, will be played between the representative teams of Oregon Agricultural College and the University of Oregon. On Saturday evening a formal reception will be tendered guests and visiting friends. Sunday morning will be devoted to church going or to such recreation as the visitors see fit to enjoy and in the afternoon open house on the campus will be observed.

Speaking of these events the Bare-meter, the student body publication, says:

No one likes to be worried, bullied, or found fault with. The "fusser" may be a woman or quite often the "fusser" is a man, as the habit is not confined to one sex.

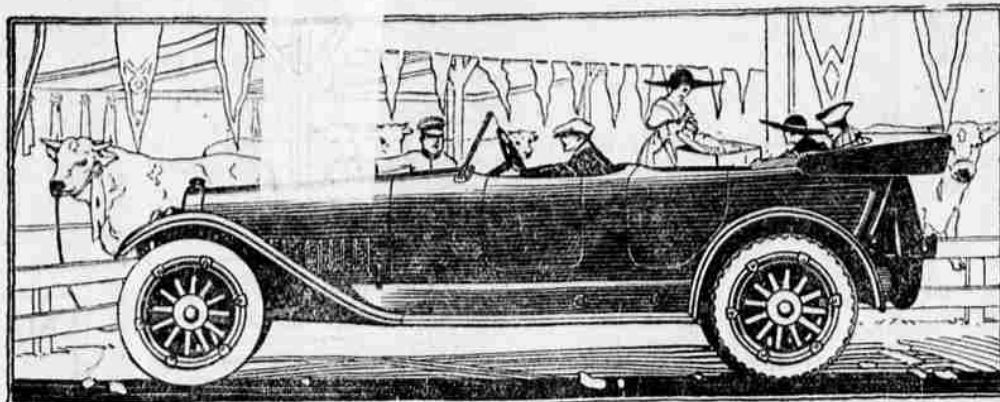
