DENTAL HYGIENE.

How to Ward Off Diseases by Care of Your Teeth.

Physicians tell us that many diseases are caused by mouths and teeth not being properly cared for. Food is taken into the mouth and masticated by decayed teeth. In the process of mastication the food enters the cavities in the teeth, is mixed with the impurities in these cavities and thus sent into the stomach. Is it any wonder that the stomach rebels against such treatment?

There is no toothbrush made that will enter the spaces between the teeth, and therefore a thorough cleansing of the teeth cannot be accomplished with the brush alone. After every meal use a piece of silk floss, which any one can readily learn to run between the teeth. In living up to this practice faithfully, no matter how laborious an operation it may at first seem, you will accomplish another most desirable object in the proper care of the teeth—namely, their separation.

With the use of a silk thread you may also learn to detect the very first signs of a cavity at the saving of future pain and expense. Teeth that are sound have a smooth surface on all sides, and a thread will glide over or between them evenly. The presence of a cavity is indicated by a roughness which is instantly transmitted to the silk thread. A slight increase of the tension will generally cause the thread to part.

The teeth may be kept white by the use of pumice stone applied on the end of an orange wood stick. It should be rubbed only on the spots required and is not to be repeated until the discolorations appear again. The rubbing should be very light in order not to penetrate the surface of the enamel. Fillings may also be brushed and kept brilliant with the use of pumice stone.

Massage of the gums is an excellent thing, serving to keep them in a healthy condition.

Some of the things which we should not do if we have the preservation of the teeth in mind are:

Never bite threads. The enamel of a front tooth may be cracked from crown to gum by too much pressure, or little grooves may be worn in a tooth that is constantly used for this purpose. More serious still is the risk of killing the nerve, which will result in the tooth turning black.

Do not neglect to brush the teeth and cleanse the mouth before going to bed and immediately upon rising in the morning as well as after every meal in order to relieve the mouth of the secretions which have a corrosive action on the enamel.
