Improvements at Milton.

The Pacific Power & Light Company has plans underway to reconstruct a part of its 7-mile flume which furnishes power to drive the dynamos at its plant eight miles south of Milton. The company expects within the next two or three years to make important improvements to its flume—building sections of it in concrete. The estimated expense of this work is around \$40,000.

Prosperity on The Touchet.

When the present year draws to an end in the Touchet Valley, it will have been found to be one of the biggest that has been experienced in the history of the valley, from all viewpoints. Not only were crops larger and returns better, but more was accomplished along the lines of building, road construction and general development; while the bank deposits are found to be higher than ever before in all the cities and towns of the valley. With the Second Blue Mountain Rodeo in Dayton last month, and the activities incident to the wind-up of harvest and the preparations for the next year's crop, October has been a busy, profitable month in a busy, profitable year.—Up-To-The Times Magazine.

Paper Mills Busy.

By the end of the week all the pulp mills of the Crown Willamette Paper company will be running and 200 more men will be employed in the mill. The Hawley Pulp & Paper company will start up its pulp machines soon. One set of grinders and wet machines in the Crown Willamette mills started up Monday morning and another unit Tuesday morning. These ma-

chines are shut down during the summer months when the river is low. The Willamette is rising steadily and the amount of power that can be developed here increasing with the fall rains. Enough pulp is made during the winter to keep the paper machines running in the summer. The Crown Willamette company had a good supply of pulp on hands when the mills started.—Oregon City Enterprise.

Dry Land Wheat Yields Well.

That wheat can be raised on some of the dry land homesteads is proven by the experience of Walter Baker, who has kept a record of yields for four years. The Baker homestead is six miles northeast of Halfway and is high enough on the mesa to be seen plainly from most parts of the valley. The first year the yield was 17 bushels and the second year 19 bushels. The third year a patch of 10 acres made an average yield of 23 bushels. This year was the best, the yield making 27 1-2 bushels on 17 acres. While the yield has shown a steady increase, it is admitted that part of the good showing this year
