OLD OKLAHOMA EDITOR DEAD

Father of C. N. Palmer of This City
Honored by Townspeople at His
Death.

As a tribute to the memory of T. J. Palmer, who was one of the first settlers in Medford and who has lived here continuously since that time participating in all the activities that has made the Medford and Grant county of today, the Medford stores closed this afternoon from 2:30 to 3:30. Most of the business men and many other friends attended the funeral at the residence.

Rev. McKeeman delivered the funeral oration paying a high tribute to Mr. Palmer's sincerity. He declared that he was a man of strong convictions and that it was recognized by all that he lived his life along the lines he honestly and sincerely felt were right.

Thomas J. Palmer, one of the founders of Medford, former Medford postmaster and the founder of the Medford Patriot, the first paper in Grant county, died at his home in Medford, Tuesday, November 7th. He was in vigorous health until a few months ago when he began failing presumably from a blood clot on the brain.

Mr. Palmer was born in Pickering, Ontario county, Canada, February 6, 1847. He came to the United States at the age of 18. After teaching school for a few years he entered the newspaper business and followed that until he sold the Patriot a few years ago. He lived in Illinois, Kansas, Iowa and Oklahoma.

Mr. Palmer was married April 4, 1871 to Sarah Lazier at Myrtle Ontario, Canada. The wife and three children, Mrs. G. E. Honey, of Kingman, Kansas; C. N. Palmer, of La Grande, Oregon; and Mrs. Fred Wright of Wakita, survive him.

Mr. Palmer was active in all public affairs, held various city offices and was a vigorous writer and vigorous fighter. He loved a fight and fought in the open ways. He always worked for what he felt was the best interests of Medford and Grant county, and rendered many a public service. The family has the sincere sympathy of many friends.

Chicago, Nov. 14—(United Press)—Lumber production increase 131-2 per cent over that of last year according to figures compiled by R. S. Kellogg of the National Lumber Manufacturers' Association here.
