Sweet Peppers.

SWEET PEPPERS have recently become one of the most popular vegetables, as housewives have learned they make very delectable dishes. The young housewife needs to know how to tell a sweet pepper from a hot one. There are two tests, first, by the smell; second, by cutting a piece off and touching it with the tongue. One taste will be sufficient, as the hot pepper is very strong and pungent, and beware, for it does not lose its strength in cooking.

Sweet peppers are both red and green in color and sometimes mixed; in selecting them for stuffing it is advisable to choose those that are not too long nor too thin. The rounder they are the better they look when served.

Sweet peppers are very popular for garnishing of salads and flavoring creamed chicken or chicken a la king. They may be combined successfully with soft cream cheese and fashioned into balls.

A seasonable dish is green corn cut from the cob, boiled in milk and one-quarter of a green pepper and one-quarter of a red one, cut in dice, cooked with the corn and seasoned to taste.

Sweet peppers combine very well with minced ham. This may be made of the remainder of boiled or baked ham. Put the ham through a meat grinder, also some sweet peppers. To three cupsful of meat use one-half cupful of peppers. In a deep bowl mix the ham, peppers, one tablespoonful parsley. Put this mixture into a deep baking dish, sprinkle the top with bread-crumbs and bits of butter and bake in a quick oven for thirty minutes.

An unusual dish is made of asparagus tips laid on crisp lettuce leaves and peppers, diced fine, sprinkled over the top, a rich mayonnaise dressing completing the dish, or the asparagus tips held in place by a ring of green or red peppers and the addition of French dressing.

The KITCHEN CUPBOARD

PLAIN VEGETABLES.

TO BLANCH GREEN BEANS.—Green beans should always be blanched. To do this drain them from the cold water and put them into water that is boiling rapidly, allowing a teaspoonful of salt to two quarts of water. Boil rapidly, with the cover partially off the saucepan, for twenty minutes. Turn into a colander and let cold water run upon them. They are now ready to be finished in any manner you like. The blanching can be done in the morning while the fire is good and the beans be finished for dinner at the proper time.

Green Beans, Plain.—One quart beans, one-half pint water, one generous tablespoonful butter, one level teaspoonful salt. String the beans if necessary and cut them into two inch lengths. Blanch them as directed. Drain and put in the saucepan with the water, salt and butter. Cook for ten minutes over a hot fire, turning the contents of the saucepan from time to time. Serve very hot. If the beans are not tender it may take fifteen minutes to cook them, but under all circumstances be careful not to overcook, as this ruins the flavor. If overcooked, green beans become yellow or brown.

Bolled Peas With Butter.—Put one quart of shelled peas in a stewpan and add enough boiling water to cover them generously. Place over a hot fire and when they begin to bubble back where the water will bubble gently. Until the peas are done cook with the cover partially off the stewpan. When the peas are tender add one teaspoonful of salt and three tablespoonfuls of good butter. Cook ten minutes longer. If the peas are not the sweet kind add a teaspoonful of sugar with the salt and butter.

Baked Eggplant.—Peel the plant and boil it whole in salted water until tender enough to pierce with silver fork. Drain and wash, adding butter, salt and pepper and two tablespoonfuls of breadcrumbs and a teaspoonful of scraped onion. When cool beat one egg into the mixture, put in baking pan, cover the top with bread-crumbs and bits of butter and bake about half an hour in an oven hot enough to brown the crumbs. This is delicious, and the recipe is a famous chef's.

Peas With Ham.—Cut the ham into small dice and brown in butter. Add a quart of peas, cover with water and add also an onion. When cooked thicken the sauce slightly with flour.

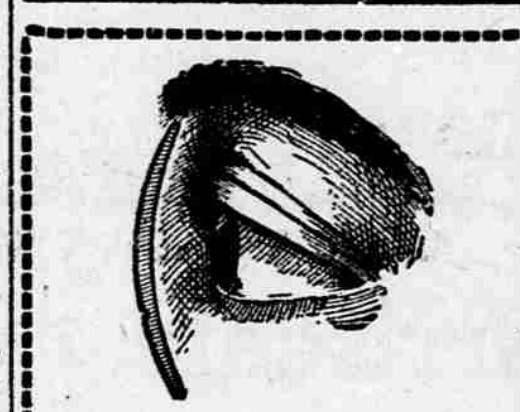
