**The Pendleton Normal.**

There is now practically no hope that Eastern Oregon will have a Normal school during the next two years. The measure which was initiated by the city of Pendleton has been hopelessly snowed under but the work that was done by the campaign committee has laid a foundation that will, sooner or later, result in the establishment of a training school in one of the large cities in the Eastern Oregon country. The fact that the bill was defeated this time reflects no discredit on the city of Pendleton nor on the management of the campaign. On the other hand, the people have been shown that there is a real need for such an institution in this section of the state and, when they realize that the tax is a small investment for such a large return as a school of that kind will give, they will be willing to permit the establishment of such a school. Without reflecting on the citizenry of other towns of the eastern part of the state, it may be said that it is highly improbable that such a splendid campaign for a measure will ever be made again unless Pendleton is willing again to undertake the burden. It is impossible for anyone not in touch with the situation to realize the sacrifices of time, labor and money which were made by the people of Pendleton during the past three months. A statewide campaign, where the principle of education is involved, is no small matter and the Pendleton citizens showed their true worth in contributing as they did of whatever they had to give. Regardless of the loss of the measure, Pendleton has received some good, for its campaign has made it recognized as the progressive city of the section. Its advantages have been published broadcast and it stands out as a city of unusual qualities.—Pendleton Tribune
