NEW SCHEME IS TRIED OUT

Pendleton Instructor Requires Students to Manage House

Salem, Ore., Nov. 17.—(Special)—Pendleton has a school teacher who has a new scheme in teaching domestic science, according to J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, who has returned from Eastern Oregon after attending the Eastern Oregon division of the Oregon state teachers' association meetings. This scheme has been in successful operation by Miss Alice Butler, head of the department of domestic science in the Pendleton high school. The idea is for the girls to manage a house in all its details.

For this purpose a furnished house of eight or nine rooms is secured and the girls put in charge. The house is rented to the teachers of the school who live in it while the girls of the domestic science department clean the windows, sweep the floors, make the beds, plan the meals, take care of the buying, keep all the household accounts and do all the things necessary to gain practical experience in house-keeping.

The teachers who pay for the house and the actual running expenses sit down to meals planned entirely by the domestic science girls who have bought and cooked the food. They take care of the electric light bills, and in fact everything. This feature of the school work is new and the

plan is apparently working out successfully as it gives the girls a practical working knowledge of household economy.

Business Men Aroused by Speech.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 17.—(Special)—"The good Lord is not going to dea-head this town over the road of Prosperity. We must pay our fare."

With these few choice words, Geo. F. Rodgers summed up the general situation in an address to a meeting of business men.

To that organization heretofore known as "The Ancient Order of Those Who Want the Other Fellow to Do It," Mr. Rodgers paid a few complimentary remarks. "This idea of a petrified Commercial club is all a joke. This organization now is one of the liveliest ones in the state. We don't want money but we do want nerve and brain power. Not numbers, but a few level headed men who are willing to do things," said Mr.

Rodgers. "A man is a civic imbecile who thinks a Commercial club can do no good. At no time have we stood at the portals of opportunity as we do now. The dark ages of the last few years are passing away and we are facing great opportunities."

All of which was preliminary to the membership campaign that is now on.
