

# UNION CO. BUDGET IS DRAFTED

Total operating expense insofar as pertains to the county proper, for the ensuing year is \$67,995.00—as estimated in the Union county budget, now determined so far as it is possible until the state tax is announced. In addition to the total named, there has been appropriated \$50,000 for roads and bridges which includes extensive work on the mountain road to Kamela which the state is going to help pay. Deducting \$8,800 estimated fees and receipts to the county, the total for the general fund to raise be-

comes \$109,195.00. To this item must be added appropriations as follows: Road fund, \$10,000; Call warrants, \$25,000; School fund, \$43,000; High school fund, \$11,000; Library fund, \$540; Indigent soldiers, \$1000.00. Total estimated amount to be raised by county taxes, not inclusive of the state's share, \$199,735.00. Budget estimates of estimated expenses in the various offices and departments of the county include the following official notice:

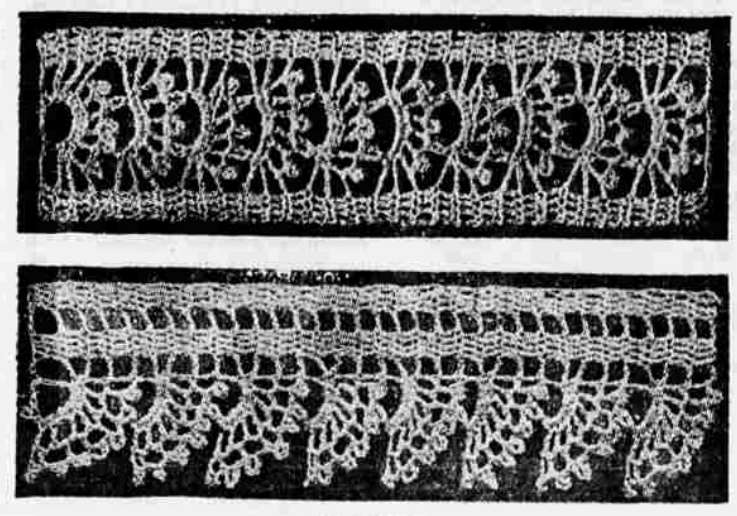

## This Lace and Insertion Designed For Underwear



**ABBREVIATIONS:** Ch., chain; d.c., double crochet; tr., treble. Materials: Crochet cotton No. 30 and a No. 5 steel crochet hook will make a lace 1 1/2 inches wide and an insertion 1 1/4 inches wide. For the Lace.—Commence with 23 chain. First Row.—Miss three chain, 1 tr. into each of the next three chain, 3 ch., miss three chain, 1 tr. into each of the next four chain, 3 ch., miss three chain, 1 tr. into next, 5 ch., 1 d.c. into last chain, 1 ch., turn. Second Row.—12 d.c. into loop of five chain, 1 d.c. on next treble, 3 ch., 4 tr. on four treble, 3 ch., 4 tr. at end (three on treble and one on top of chain that turned), 3 ch., turn. Third Row.—Miss one treble, 3 tr. on three treble, 3 ch., 4 tr. on four treble, 3 ch., 1 tr. on first double crochet, \* 2 ch., miss one double crochet, 1 tr. on next double crochet; repeat from \* five times, 7 ch., turn. Fourth Row.—1 d.c. into fifth chain from hook, 1 tr. into first hole, \* 5 ch., 1 d.c. around top of treble just made, 1 ch., 1 tr. into next hole; repeat from \* five times, 1 ch., 1 tr. on last treble, 3 ch., 4 tr. on four treble, 4 ch., 4 tr. at end, 3 ch., turn. Fifth Row.—Miss one treble, 3 tr., 3 ch., 4 tr. on four treble, 3 ch., 1 tr. on next treble, 5 ch., miss one picot on scallop, 1 d.c. into next, 1 ch., turn and repeat from commencement of second row. For Insertion.—Commence with 22 chain. First Row.—Miss three chain, 1 tr. into each of the next three chain, 4 ch., miss three chain, 1 d.c. into next, 6 ch., miss four chain, 1 d.c. into next, 4 ch., miss three chain, 1 tr. into each of the next four chain, 3 ch., turn. Second Row.—Miss one treble, 3 tr. on three treble, 4 ch., 1 d.c. on double crochet, 11 d.c. into loop, 1 d.c. into next double crochet, 4 ch., 4 tr. at end, 3 ch., turn. Third Row.—Miss one treble, 3 tr., 2 ch., miss one double crochet, 1 tr. into next, \* 5 ch., 1 d.c. into top of treble just made, 1 ch., miss one double crochet, 1 tr. into next; repeat from \* four times, 2 ch., 4 tr. at end, 3 ch., turn. Fourth Row.—Miss one treble, 3 tr., 4 ch., miss one picot, 1 d.c. into next, 6 ch., miss one picot, 1 d.c. into next, 4 ch., 4 tr. on four treble, 3 ch., turn; repeat from commencement of second row.
