Elaborate Arrangements Made to Entertain and Instruct Such as May Breathe Old Customs and Go to Church Tomorrow.

Tomorrow is the day churches of all creeds in La Grande ask the citizens of the city to attend some church. The appeal has gone out not so much to or from any sect but from all churches, in following out a custom freely and successfully used in larger cities. Three thousand people should be in church tomorrow in La Grande, during all the various services, ministers think. The promoters hold out the idea that every man, church member or not, should listen to a sermon now and then, and elsewhere it has been found very successful to send out a general appeal from all churches the same day. Oftentimes those who may go tomorrow may not go again but once in church is deemed better than never in church. The music, the logic of the preacher, the prayer or some other phase should have at least some appeal to every citizen.
