Farm Tools Higher.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—(Special)—Farmers face a heavy increase in the price of farm implements, threshers and tractors, effective the first of the year. This became practically certain today as a result of the annual meeting of the manufacturers of farm machinery.

The system of long term payments will probably be done away with, it was learned, and what amounts to cash prices—90 per cent down—will

be demanded. High crop prices and the new rural credits system make it possible for the farmer to comply with these changes delegates said. They cited increased cost of materials as the reason for the proposed advance.

The delegates went into secret session. It was learned that most of the delegates agreed advanced cost of materials made higher prices for farm machinery necessary.

Delegates denied a formal agreement was made or would be made to increase prices.

TO GIVE AWAY PIES LIKE MOTHER MADE

National Apple Show Has Novel Plan to Popularize Fruit.

"What's the good of apples if you don't eat them?" is the question asked by Gordon C. Corbaley, secretary-manager of the ninth National Apple show.

The question will be answered in a novel manner at the show to be held in Spokane, November 20 to 25. Mr. Corbaley is arranging to install a model kitchen in the apple show enclosure, with six large ovens working day and night under the supervision of a dozen chefs.

Here 10,000 apple pies will be cooked each day of the show and distributed free to every one entering the grounds. Each admission ticket will carry a coupon entitling the holder to one free pie, and the model kitchen is expected to be the most densely inhabited portion of the show.

"There is a big idea back of this free pie distribution," states Mr. Corbaley. "During the week tens of thousands of people will visit the show. Every one of these will not only see the most perfect apples grown anywhere in the world, but they will have an opportunity to sample these products between pie crusts. Thus we will be helping to popularize the apple as the king of fruits."

EXCHANGE BRIEVITIES

Wallowa Budget Ready.
(Wallowa Sun.)

Wallowa's municipal budget has been drafted for the presentation to the tax payers to be held in the council rooms on the 29th day of November at 7:30 p. m., at which time the citizens are invited to be present and express their approval or register a protest against the same, or ever afterwards hold their peace.

The budget calls for \$5,115.00 for the running expenses of the city for the coming year. The revenue estimated to be raised by licenses of different kinds, fines, etc., is \$135.00, leaving a balance of \$4,980.00 to be raised by direct taxation. The levy will be about 10.5 mills figuring on the valuation of \$472,134.00 of the city. On the same rates as figured for last year's assessment the taxes are less yet the city valuation is less on account of the 75 per cent assessment.

The affairs of the city of Wallowa are run more economically than any other city in Eastern Oregon.

A Relic.

Marsh Davis received quite a curiosity through the express office yesterday. It is a hickory cane cut on the old Andrew Jackson farm, known as the Hermitage farm, just out from Nashville, Tenn. J. R.
