Eugene, Ore., Nov. 20.—(Special)—Louis E. Bean, of this city, who was elected to the house of representatives in the next legislature, is a candidate for the speakership, among other, including Robert N. Stanfield, of Umatilla county, Dr. J. E. Anderson, of The Dalles and John M. Mann, A. C. Callan, and K. K. Kubli, of Portland.

The ability of Mr. Bean as a legislator is recognized over the state as he has been a member of the senate several terms.

Appearances indicate that Mr. Stanfield will have strong support from Multnomah county and from Eastern Oregon.
