Tasty Dishes.

KIDNEY STEW.—A beef kidney cut up and washed, two onions, three potatoes, salt, pepper. Boil an hour. Dumplings: Two cupfuls of flour, salt, a teaspoonful of baking powder, water enough to form in balls. Steam in stew till light and done.

Meat Pudding.—A pound of skirt steak (22 cents a pound). Cut up small an onion. Now rub a cupful of fine chopped suet into two cupfuls of flour, salt and a little water to roll out as pie crust. Put meat and onion with salt and pepper in and draw up the crust around it. Boil in pudding cloth two hours and put a pall cover on bottom of kettle you boil it in to prevent it sticking.

Bean Soup.—A cupful of cold baked beans, an onion, a cupful of stock, two potatoes cut up. Boil for an hour.

Beef Stew.—Cut up a cupful of lean meat, an onion, a carrot, three potatoes, salt and pepper. Boil all together till tender.

Crown Roast.—Have the chop rack cut with as many chops as are needed to allow two to a portion and then skewered in place. Fill the center with a very light savory dressing made of dry crumbs, a cupful of button mushrooms that have been sauted in butter, juice of an onion, a gill of melted butter, pepper, salt and the slightly beaten white of an egg. Stuff tightly, wrap the scraped end of each bone in a wax paper cap, place in a buttered roasting pan and bake. When done slip little chop papers over the ends of the bones and garnish with parsley.

Mock Roast Beef.—A cupful of fine chopped meat, an egg, a cupful of breadcrumbs, salt, pepper, a little soup stock. Form in a loaf and serve with mashed potatoes and boiled onions.

RICH CAKES.

HUNGARIAN LOAF CAKE.—One-half pound flour, one-half pound powdered sugar, six ounces raisins, two ounces candied peel, a teaspoonful soda, one-half pound rice flour, six ounces butter, six ounces sultana, one-half pint milk. Cream butter and sugar, sift in flour, add other dry ingredients, heat milk and dissolve the soda in it; then mix with rest. Bake in moderate oven about two and one-half hours, but test by piercing with a skewer before removing from tin.

Madeira Cake.—One-half pound flour, two teaspoonfuls baking powder, two eggs, one slice citron peel, one-quarter pound butter, six ounces granulated sugar, three-quarters gill milk, pinch of salt. Cream butter and sugar. Beat eggs and add them alternately with the flour and salt to the butter and sugar. Mix in enough milk to make thick batter. Lastly stir in the baking powder and pour into well greased lined tin. Put slice of citron on top and bake one hour in moderate oven.

Sultana Cake.—Twelve ounces flour, six ounces sultana, an egg, a tablespoonful baking powder, milk as required, six ounces butter, six ounces brown sugar, an ounce mixed peel, one-half saltspoonful salt. Sift flour, salt and baking powder, rub in shortening, add sultanas, sugar and finely chopped

peel. Beat egg and add; then stir in enough milk to moisten. Put in greased lined tin and bake one and one-half hours in moderate oven.

Raisin Cake.—Twelve ounces flour, six ounces sugar, three teaspoonfuls baking powder, two gills milk, one-quarter teaspoonful spice, three ounces dripping, three ounces butter, an egg, six ounces raisins. Sift flour and rub in shortening, add sugar and well beaten egg and milk. Beat five minutes, stir in raisins and spices and put in a paper lined tin. Bake an hour.

Rich Plum Cake.—A pound flour, four ounces butter, three-quarters pound raisins, two ounces glace cherries, three eggs, a teaspoonful grated chocolate, six ounces butter, ten ounces of sugar, six ounces currants, three ounces mixed peel, two ounces almonds, one-half teaspoonful mixed spice, milk as required. Cream shortening and sugar. Sift flour, beat eggs and add them alternately to creamed mixture. Add fruit peel, almonds, chocolate and spices. Beat very thoroughly, adding milk enough to moisten. Line tin with two layers greased paper. Put in mixture and cover with greased paper. Bake three to four hours. Leave twenty-four hours before icing.
