LET STUDENTS HELP IN APPLE JUDGING

To educate agricultural college students along the line of commercial packing, a new contest has been devised by the trustees of the ninth National Apple show, which will be held at Spokane November 20 to 25.

Each of the northwestern colleges will have an elimination apple judging contest to select two students to attend the show. Instead of these teams working independently, they will spend the week working with and assisting the board of judges in scoring every exhibit at the show. At the conclusion of the show the judges will award a gold medal to the team showing the greatest aptitude.

GROWERS TO LEARN PACKING OF APPLES

A daily packing school designed to help northwestern apple growers in mastering the details of the standard grade and pack will be substituted for the world's championship packing contest at the ninth National Apple show to be held at Spokane November 20 to 25.

Secretary-Manager Gordon C. Corbaley announces that a staff of expert packers has been engaged to give lectures and demonstrations each day for the benefit of the growers in attendance. A new feature of the standard pack will be emphasized each day, it is announced.

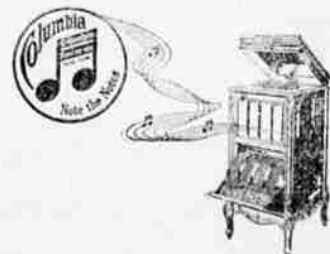
