## ASSESSMENTS WORRY CITY

Commissioners Take Up Whole Question of North Second Delinquents—Forced Sales Likely to Begin at Once.

Delinquent street and sewer assessments usurped a greater portion of the attention of the City commission at its meeting last night. For several weeks these delinquents have been a thorn in the side of the city government and last night the matter reached the point where means and ways for selling the interested property came up. After prolonged negotiations and litigation the city some time ago made considerable concessions on the disputed payments for North Second street but only in isolated instances did the litigants accept the concessions made and now the city fathers are going to compel payments. The city coffers are at a point where immediate payment of interest and principal for the many thousands of dollars outstanding delinquently for street improvement and sewers must be made.

J. C. Henry presented a petition for permit to add a sort of a shelter to the Southside of the Public Library building, with a view of having a protected driveway to his property and the morgue he is building. The matter was referred to the city manager and the library commissioners.

L. L. Snodgrass appeared before the commission with a petition to have more private alarms instituted in the homes of volunteer firemen. Some already have them but it is urged others be equipped with the call system which rings jointly with the main alarm bell.

The commission entered into a contract with Wong Tan for the lease of the septic tank land. Wong is to pay the sum of \$100 per year for the right to farm that portion which is not utilized in the tank area.

All commissioners were present.

General manager's report for the week ending November 18th, 1916: (To the Commission)—No fires last week.

The water superintendent's report for the week is as follows: Spent \$28.75 for repair work and \$5.75 for two taps.

The street superintendent's report for the week is as follows: Spent \$28.50 for team and driver; \$40.65 for extra men and \$15.00 for white wing; had four days work by prisoners amounting to \$8.00; \$2.80 for sharpening tools. Hauled 43 1-2 yards of gravel on Island City road from N. avenue. Did some other small jobs.

The city treasurer's report for the week is as follows: Receipts, \$109.70; water rents; \$470.24 interest on assessments; \$2002.22 payments on installments; \$2.00 for four electrical

permits; \$1208.74 taxes from county treasurer. Disbursements, \$105.00 interest on improvement bonds; \$9.27 general fund warrants paid with \$1.16 interest on same; \$7.05 road fund warrants paid, with 10 cents interest on same; \$52.82 general fund warrants purchased for B. C. P. L. sinking fund and \$58.14 water warrants paid.

The city recorder's report for the week is as follows: Received \$148.40 from payment on sewer Adams and Jefferson; \$25.00 for rent of septic tank farm; \$10.00 from fines and 50 cents from one building permit. Issued warrant for bill allowed in the sum of \$5.00, and \$21.66 for one labor certificate allowed.

The chief of police's report for the week is as follows: Number of arrests three; served 45 meals; received \$10.00 fines; two lights were out on the 13th of the month.
