SAFETY LECTURE OFFERED

"Plain Safety Committees" Should Be Named After Illustrated Talk Is Delivered.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 24.—(Special)—Thousands of needless accidents occur every year in Oregon, and several hundreds of thousands of dollars must be spent to compensate for them.

"To sit idly by and view this annual waste with complacency is no longer possible. The movement for industrial safety has now spread across the country from the steel mills of the East to the sawmills of the Pacific coast. This movement has saved thousands of lives and has greatly reduced the cost of compensation in many places," says the Oregon federation for industrial safety, which was organized a short time ago to promote the safety movement in Oregon.

"In Oregon a large number of serious permanent disabilities occurring on lumber knives and power-driven saws in sawmills, as well as other types of painful accidents can undoubtedly be prevented," said Ben H. Williams, secretary of the new federation and a member of the State University extension faculty.

The federation stands ready to provide an illustrated talk on safety work, with special reference to sawmills. Arrangements for such a talk were recently made by the mill at Gardiner, Or. A plant safety committee was appointed after this meeting. "The appointment of a plant safety committee to take charge of the work of accident prevention is a desirable outcome of these meetings," said Mr. Williams. Requests from employers for the co-operation of the federation will be gladly received by the secretary.

The members of the federation are the state industrial accident commission, the state bureau of labor under

O. P. Hoff, and the University extension division. No charge is made for the lecture.

RETURN CARGO CRYING NEED

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 24.—(Special)—Return cargoes for the vessels which carry our products was the point that Mr. W. D. B. Dodson, of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, emphasized in an address on Transportation and its Relation to the Development of Commerce, to the commerce students recently.

The Chamber of Commerce realizes that we are far from the large consuming markets and that the railroads cannot reduce the rates. In fact there is every indication that there will be an increase. Water transportation is the only solution of the difficulty and return cargoes are necessary to stimulate interest in this industry. Oregon is exceedingly rich in raw products for transportation, but it is impossible to build up trade with other countries without return cargoes. As an illustration Seattle was cited with its smelters, sugar refineries, and powder works to take care of the tin, ore, raw sugar and nitrates, which are secured in return for wheat, lumber, and manufactured products.

The Portland Chamber of Commerce is trying in every way possible to encourage the investment of capital in the construction of smelters, woolen mills, and other factories. They have solicited the aid of the State and the co-operation of every citizen. Mr. Dodson is working on an eminent domain act to present to the coming legislature.

PRICES FIRM DURING WEEK

Little Variation in Any Grade of Foodstuff—Wholesalers Unable to Get Enough to Fill Their Orders in Many Lines.

Without excitement of any new sort, and with little fluctuation retail prices have held a firm and even tone this week—to a marked degree in fact. It is a far cry from the western slopes of the Andes to the dawn of women's rights, emancipation and the vote, but the morning star of duty as wife and mother, even in their limited conception of its meaning, shines all the brighter in comparison. In their own wide ramified family circles their influence is felt, while their outside interests centers in the church.

The wealthy senora is looked up to by her poorer sisters, and in the small towns and haciendas (ranches), where her numerous family connections are the leading people of the community, she extends a kindly and charitable beneficence to them and to all who serve them in any capacity. When these women come of old Spanish stock they are extremely exclusive, and ancient rules of etiquette guide their social relationships. Their daughters go to the convent schools, receive a limited education, and return home to continue the same regime as has held sway since the day when their forebears left Spain.

In family life there is much affectionate generosity and contentment; life for them is simpler and less intense than in Anglo-Saxon countries. There is a lack of realization of the seriousness and meaning of life, an habitual inclination to take things lightly. With no struggle to better their lot in life or fight against untoward circumstances, they calmly resign themselves to the fate of the unseen hand.—The Christian Herald.
