**Ruling on Adamson Law Up to Supreme Court.**

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 25.—(Special)—All preliminary obstacles to a decision by the supreme court on the Adamson law were wiped out Friday evening and the only possible hitch lies in the question of whether the highest court will advance the case and render a decision by January 1st, when the law is scheduled to go into effect.

The railroad cases set for trial in federal court here were postponed until after the supreme court decision. Railroad and government attorneys

announced that a postponement of all railroad cases throughout the country would be requested.

The test case selected for the supreme court is the Missouri, Oklahoma & Gulf case, which was heard hurriedly Wednesday by Judge Hooker, who held the law unconstitutional. Appeal was immediately taken.

**Road Over Blue Mountains**

There is considerable discussion in Umatilla County over the movement to secure better roads over the Blue Mountains, one by way of Toll Gate from Milton into the Wellowa country and one by way of Bingham Springs and up the south fork of the Umatilla river from Pendleton to La Grande. Both roads lead through the national forest reserve and the county court has already applied for federal aid. An inspector will be sent over the ground soon. An effort will be made to secure the assistance of the congressmen in getting appropriations.

**Held Court On Sunday.**

Col. J. H. Raley has returned from Lewiston where he represented R. N. Stanfield in a case argued and submitted to the U. S. district court. For the first time in his life, Col. Raley states he was in court on Sunday, the judge holding court Sunday in order to make connections to get to another town on Monday. The case in which Col.
