Tips For The Farmer

Smoking Meats As Important As Curing Them.

In the November Farm and Fireside, the farm paper published at Springfield, Ohio, a writer says:

"The dry-curing process requires the same salt, sugar and salt-peter preservative, but the meat is first rubbed daily with the salt preparation and then two or three times a week for about the same length of time that meat is kept in pickle. Between rubbings the meat is kept in tight boxes, and covered with the salt preparation.

"Smoking is just as important as the curing process if a perfect farmed product is to result. After the pickling or dry curing is completed, hams and shoulders are rinsed off, and if the curing has continued for a month or longer the pieces will be improved by soaking in cold water overnight before hanging up to be smoked.

"My preference in smokehouses is for one made of either brick or cement. Have it tight enough to exclude flies and insects. Such a house will keep smoked meat in good condition until wanted. But for temporary use, dry-goods boxes, hogsheds, or even barrels will do, provided the smoke is introduced from outside. Where fire is to be placed under meat, the height of the smokehouse should be 8 or 10 feet.

DRESS TRIMMINGS.

Style Tips About the Very Latest Garnishings.

For those who may still be doubtful regarding the fashionable dress trimmings of the season a review will not be amiss.

Among the most salient trimmings is wool embroidery in separable motifs or in bands. The richest oriental colors are used for the purpose, and in some instances the wool is combined with metal embroideries. Motifs in silk combined with wool are also in vogue. Such trimmings you can use appropriately on odd shaped pockets, on belts, on flat sashes, on corners of tunics and on the ever present bags. Wool fringes in blue, gray and black are in high favor. Beaded fringes, drops and tassels are very well liked.

On evening gowns beaded bandings are very modish. They are used as garnitures, as straps for corsages, and in some instances they are used to give the effect of a necklace. These bands are particularly well liked in jet, in crystal and in opal.

Persian colorings prove an incentive in the making of head medallions. Combinations of bead with chenille are used on gowns for both afternoon and evening. Chenille alone is also a strong trimming and is used in all sorts of colors.

Never before have spangles been so important. They are offered in infinite variety and are used largely to form the long waisted bodice, suggestive of the moen eye line.

Fur in larger quantities than ever is a favored trimming. Mole and seal are the favorites, but coney, skunk and opossum are not far behind. Fur cloth is also used a great deal and has proved a very pleasing substitute for the real fur.

Where laces are concerned silver, gold and chintilly seem to be the favored ones.

out the dust a figured silk top is slipped on to the upper rim, closing tightly with a silk cord of the same color. Any number of variations may come from this design.

WHEN YOU SERVE TEA.

Things to Do In Order to Be Really Hospitable.

Remember to add as a finishing touch to the tray or tea table a vase with a few flowers, a single rose, three or four asters or a yellow daffodil or so placed in a bud vase or held in place in a flat dish by a Japanese frog.

Always serve cream as well as lemon. Many persons do not enjoy tea without cream, and of course they will not be so frank as to tell you so when they see that the tea tray is not supplied with any.

Serve the cut sugar in the small half lumps. For a small cup of tea a large lump often proves too much, and it is always awkward to have to break a lump or to take a lump from the cup when it is half dissolved.

Take pains to see that the teapot and hot water jug are both well heated before pouring in the boiling water. By doing so the temperature of the boiling water will not be reduced in bringing the teapot and jug to level.

Remember to carry the pot to the boiling water and pour the water on the tea leaves while the water is actually boiling. Many persons wrongly feel that if the water has boiled it matters little whether or not it is still boiling when it is applied to the tea leaves.

Always serve sandwiches or toast in small portions. It is very awkward for the tea drinker to have to manage large portions. Bread and butter sandwiches should be of wafer thinness and should be cut in inch wide strips. A goodly supply should be on hand to make up for the smallness of the single pieces.

Guimpees For Children.

Guimpees are coming into vogue again for children. The practical wash fabrics are still to be among those popular with the smart little folk. Little plaid skirts seem to be used on practically every model, even on the smallest child. Some have the jackets slipped over the head or buttoned on the shoulders. Guimpees, which have often been made for little folk from their mothers' shirt waists, will be of much use to them this season, since practically all have the little white sleeves and yoke of lawn, linen, batiste, organdie and other sheer materials. For the fancy dresses georgette is used.

THE DOCTOR TELLS BATH SECRETS

An Expert Lays Down a Regime
For the Business Woman—Excellent Recipe For Making Oatmeal Bags For the Toilet.

GOOD grooming, without correct bathing, is almost an impossibility. The society woman can bathe when she likes. The business woman must arrange her baths so that they will not interfere with her business hours. And both women must be careful to select a bath best suited to their physical and nervous condition as well as their occupation.

All baths are not cleansing. This is particularly true of the cold bath. The woman with an oily skin gets absolutely no results from a cold bath, and when one has a skin disease, like acne, eczema, etc., the cold bath irritates and increases it.

The sponge as an aid in bathing has been generally condemned by latter day physicians and beauty specialists, as it is said to harbor germs and the skin excretions. Fastidious women now use a bath mitten of a porous texture or loose woven Turkish toweling in the place of the sponge, and unless the skin is tender a camel's hair flesh brush can be used. There is also what is known as the air bath, which means using a basin or small tin tub instead of the regulation bathtub and sponging off in a room flooded with sunshine and fresh air.

A good regime for baths for the business woman is this: Three times a week at night take either a tepid or a warm bath, using a good soap or soap powder. The tepid bath ranges in temperature from 85 to 90 degrees, the warm bath between 92 and 98. This temperature can be ascertained by the use of a thermometer, which can be bought at any first class drug store or hardware store. Both the tepid and warm baths act as a sedative. When the water is below 85 or above 98 it stimulates or shocks and is not an aid to sleep. If a business woman, if the skin is very oily, a pinch of borax, a few drops of benzoin or toilet ammonia may be poured into the bath. Highly perfumed and colored soaps should be avoided, and a pure white or castile soap which you can taste with the tongue without feeling a biting sensation is the one you want to use for bathing purposes.

When the skin is much irritated by contact with dust and grime use oatmeal bath bags instead of soap. Buy cheesecloth in quantities and cut the bags about four inches square, fill them loosely with the following mixture and never use a bag but once, throwing it away after once used:

Oatmeal, five pounds; powdered borax, one pound; one pound; almond meal, one pound; old castile soap, scraped to a powder, half a pound. Mix together and fill the bags.

Then every morning let the business woman take a tepid bath before breakfast and if greatly exhausted sprinkle into this water sea salt, which she can buy at any drug store.

Coats For Traveling.

Traveling coats are being made of very thick rough surfaced materials, heavy rough serge, thick velours, de-laine or jersey cloth. The jersey cloths for winter wraps and suits appear under various names, such as winter jersey, "tricho double" and the like.

Almost all of the new coat models have a wide belt, catching in the fullness at the front, but leaving the back loose. They also have enormous pockets. In one of the shops was exhibited a smart garment of this description in velours de-laine, with pockets placed quite high, and coming from under the arms from these pockets started plaits, giving fullness to the coat, which had no belt.

Somerset Salad.

Chill stewed prunes and remove stones. Fill cavities with peanuts. Arrange prunes in groups of three or four in nests of lettuce leaves and sprinkle with finely chopped peanuts. Serve with French dressing.

DUSTLESS DUSTERS.
Dustless dusters and mops are now so generally used that nothing need be said in their favor, but perhaps some women do not know how easily and cheaply they can make these labor saving appliances for themselves. Cut cheesecloth into squares of the required size, hem and dip into linseed oil or plain kerosene. Dry the cloths in the open air, and you have your dustless dusters.
For the floor mop take old stockings and cut them into two inch strips. Tie them to an old broom handle and tack them fast. Then soak in the oil and dry in the open air. Shorter strips of stockings can be tacked to an old brush handle and will be found very convenient for stairs and other small spaces.
All of these dusters and mops can be washed and when dry will be as good as ever. After several washings, however, they should be redipped in the oil and dried in the open air.
