PIONEER WOMAN PASSES AT 49

Demise of Former La Grande Resident Occurs at Walla Walla Recently Was Born Here

Mrs. Viola Adlora Robbs Mun passed away at her home in Walla Walla, Wash., on November 11, 1916, age 49 years.

Mrs. Mun will be long remembered by old pioneer residents of La Grande and Grand Ronde valley, where she

was born and raised. She was married 33 years ago to James Robert Mun, who survives her. To this union seven children were born, Mrs. Josie Hooker and one young son, Walter, preceded her to the grave. She leaves her husband, J. H. Mun and five children to mourn her loss. They are: Charles E. Mun, Volnier, Idaho; Oscar Mun, Walla Walla; Mrs. Bonnie Cantrill, La Grande; Mrs. Edith Dyer, Walla Walla, and Mrs. Manilla Alice Boyd, Spokane. Besides her aged mother, Mrs. Sarah Robbs, three brothers, William, Thomas J., and Ben

F. Robbs, all of La Grande; also three grand children, Ralph Hooker, Baker, and two small sons of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Cantrill. Five sisters have preceded Mrs. Mun to the grave. They were: Mrs. Frank Mun, Miss Eva Robbs, Mrs. Carrie Heisner, Mrs. Lizzie Bartness, and Mrs. L. Elledge. She leaves numerous nieces and nephews.

The funeral which was held in Walla Walla on November 14, 1916, was largely attended. The flowers from friends being many.

GOODALL CASE IS REVERSED

Telocaset Stockman Wins Appeal to Circuit Court After Paying Fine.

Salem, Nov. 28.—(United Press)—Scott Goodall's case appealed from Union county, on a charge first

brought in Union alleging cruelty to animals, was decided today by the Supreme court. Judge Benson, writing the opinion, reversed Judge Knowles' judgment for the plaintiff. The sufficiency of the complaint was at issue.

Goodall was first tried and convicted on the charge in Union by a justice jury. He appealed and was convicted by a jury in the circuit court, neither the district attorney nor the sheriff having charge of the case until it reached the circuit court. He was fined \$100.00, which he paid, and sentenced to jail but sentence suspended. Whether or not he will be able to get his \$100 back is yet to be decided.

Goodall owns a stock ranch in the Telocaset country and the complaint charged that he wilfully abused his stock.
