DEATH CLAIMS

MRS. J. PALMER

Wife of Pioneer Citizen Victim of Complication of Diseases—Funeral Date Uncertain—Relatives Coming to Funeral.

Mrs. Joseph Palmer, esteemed wife of Joseph Palmer, one of the earliest living settlers of Union county, died this morning at eight o'clock after a short illness commencing last Saturday. A complication of weakness of the heart and pneumonia were responsible. Relatives of the deceased and of her husband are on their way

to La Grande but some little uncertainty prevails concerning the funeral. A nephew, Isaac Hoops of Bremerton, Washington, will arrive tomorrow but other blood relatives have not been heard from. A brother lives in Iowa, and a sister in Pennsylvania. There are no children. Mrs. Palmer came to La Grande in 1896, Mr. Palmer having gone to Pennsylvania to marry her that year. Mr. Palmer had already lived in La Grande close to a quarter century at that time, he having first set foot in this community in 1864. The deceased was born September 4th, 1855. She was, therefore 61 years of age. A host of friends grieve her untimely death. She was an ardent worker in church circles, affiliated with the Methodist church, and always an altruistic person who looked contin-

uously to the welfare of others before herself. The grieving husband's relatives at Baker, and the many near relatives in La Grande, constitute a big family circle who will participate in their Thanksgiving dinners tomorrow with heavy hearts.

Juarez Racing Is To Re-Open Thursday

Automatic Book Maker Takes Place of "Shady" Men, and Gamblers Have Confidence in the Races This Season.

Juarez, Mexico, Nov. 29.—(United Press)—There is at least one American institution, which in spite of bandits, defacto governments and disputes regarding the status of Gen. Pershing's punitive force, will flourish the same as usual in Mexico this winter. Beginning with tomorrow, the Juarez Jockey club, backed by American capital, will open its annual 100 or more days of racing. To place the sport of horse racing on a more firm footing and to eliminate the danger of a bad reputation through the wrong sort of gambling on the races, books will be replaced at this meet by pari-mutuel machines. Race track followers believe the "iron men" are the best bookmakers to be obtained and expect the machines to do much toward boosting the Juarez stock. Juarez, the quaint old city across the Rio Grande from El Paso, has changed governments many times since the track was opened, but every year has found the Jockey club pursuing its business, regardless of machine guns, rifles and cannon.

Col. M. J. Winn, manager of the track, anticipate a big boom at the local course since it has been determined to put in pari-mutuels instead of the bookmakers. More than 200 horses have been shipped here from the Northern tracks. Juarez is said to have lost money at its last winter meeting, but this is not preventing horsemen from shipping their steeds here for this winter's affair.

CITY REGISTRATION CONFUSING

Voters seem to have trouble digesting requirements of registration for the city election. Briefly stated it is required that every citizen be registered for the city election regardless of the county election registration. One has no connection with the other. There are four city election wards and 13 in the city from the standpoint of county precincts. Once registered in a city ward, re-registration is unnecessary unless the elector moves to another precinct. This is all that is required: If you voted at the last city election and haven't moved your residence since, you don't need to register this fall.

CLATSOP TO BUILD ROADS

Three Districts Outside of Towns Raise \$93,000 by Taxes

Astoria, Or., Nov. 29.—(Special)—Clatsop County plans to prosecute its road improvement work during the coming Summer even more strenuously than before. The three road districts embracing the territory lying outside the incorporated cities and towns have levied special taxes that

will raise \$93,000 for road improvement projects, and the County Court will undoubtedly appropriate a liberal sum out of the general fund for the repair and construction of bridges, as well as to assist in the highway extensions.

Astoria will raise \$21,000, and Seaside, Hammond and Warrenton will raise about \$2500 each by special taxation to be used in bettering the county roads.
