We are just now beginning to develop the resources of our command. We mine iron in about one-half of the states in the United States, and we mine 20 times as much coal as in all Europe. Our oil and coal measures are apparently inexhaustible. Our country stands on a pedestal of 600 square miles of solid iron and coal.

We supply one-half of the gold and silver output of the world. Our money is accepted everywhere, and our credit is good throughout the entire world, and our national flag is

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honored and respected where ever it appears as never before. Peace reigns within our borders, and the day of diplomacy has taken the place of the day of battle, especially since the Honorable Woodrow Wilson has had charge of the national government, and now the troubled waters are calm, and the ship of state sails gallantly over a peaceful sea.

Let us now give thanks, also, for the zeal of the church of God. There is a forward movement all along the line. Peace and brotherly love and harmony prevail between the various denominations. They have come to understand each other better and are working in greater harmony than hitherto. More is being done to reach the masses and the heathen. There has never been a time in the history of this nation when the people should be more interested in missionary enterprise than at present.

And the church in this country was never in better condition financially to take the world for God than now.

The cause of God will never roll backward in this nation. He has "Sounded forth his trumpet that shall never call retreat; and He is sifting out the hearts of men before His judgment seat.
