LATE WALLOWA COUNTY NEWS

Fined for Shooting Ducks.

(Elgin Recorder.)
Two duck hunters got on the state bird refuge when out a week ago. On complaint of J. M. Fritts they were arrested and brought before Justice A. B. Conaway. Both the hunters, W. M. Vanderford and Jess Hiner, pleaded guilty, and were fined. Most of the farm lands along the river are in a game refuge, where hunting of any kind is forbidden. Farmers owning the land are empowered to proceed against violators. The refuge was created by the state before it stocked the district with pheasants and other birds. The existence of the refuge is not known to some new comers who are likely to violate the regulations without intending to do so.

Mrs. C. A. Dunn and children went to La Grande Friday, preceding Mr. Dunn who will join them later and then all will go on to Caldwell, where they expect to make their home. Mr. Dunn lived for a time in Swamp Creek pass, selling out his land and farm equipment recently.

Fred W. Falconer shipped 15 cars of sheep last Saturday to Nyssa to feed thru the winter. A large part of his extensive bands of sheep are now outside the county, at points where he has bought hay cheaper than it can be had here. Mr. Falconer will take no chances on storms on winter range.

Ask Aid in Preparing County's Early History.

The historical committee of the Pioneers' association of Wallowa county met at Joseph November 22 to plan a course of action whereby it might carry out its task. The association last year recommended that the committee buy a book in which to place for preservation photographs of pioneers and their families, biographies, obituaries, historical poems and other writings, pictures of landmarks and such other material as should be judged of interest.

Without the co-operation of the public, especially of the children and friends of the early settlers interested in a correct statement of facts, the task of the committee is well nigh hopeless. Therefore it asks all to assist in gathering the material desired, which should be sent to any member of the committee within reach. At the next meeting the committee hopes to make a start on the preparation of its permanent historical work. The committee consists of Mrs. Asa McCully, of Joseph, Mrs. John McDonald, of Wallowa, and Mrs. W. W. White, of Enterprise.

With two traction engines furnishing the motive power, another landmark of the town has started on its travels from Main street to a new location. It is the two story frame structure for years the property of D. W. Sheahan, on the lot of F. S. Ashley, east of his building occupied by the House Furnishing company store and the Hub store. The site is being cleared preparatory to the erection of a new brick or concrete store building.

The old structure has been sold to "Jack" Johnson, who also has the contract to dig the new basement. He will take the landmark to the neighborhood of the mill where it will be transformed into a boarding house.

The building was jacked up a few days ago and two long logs placed under it as skids. As there are electric

poles directly in front of it, the structure will be shifted west first, then hauled out into the street, and on to its destination. The tractors on the job are C. S. Haney's and George R. Matthis' Caterpillar.

A few years after the town was started, F. S. Ivanhoe erected the building in 1890, facing east on west First street, on the alley, on the ground now occupied by the north half of the City hotel. Mr. Ivanhoe had just come to the new town and used the first floor for his law office. Later he and Mr. Sheahan were partners in law practice and they occupied the rooms together.

One pint of sour cream with 1 teaspoon soda in it; add graham flour to make rather a stiff batter. To be split, buttered and eaten with honey.

Split Pea Soup

Two cups split peas, boil 3 hours in 2 quarts water, season with salt, pepper and a small piece of salt pork; if water boils out, add gradually more, enough when strained to make 2 quarts of soup. Serve boiling hot with toasted bread.

Baked Mackerel

Clean the fish and split it down the back. Making a dressing of rolled cracker crumbs, moistened with melted butter and capers; put this inside the fish, first rubbing with a little salt and pepper. Tie a cord around the fish to keep the dressing in; dredge the outside with flour stick bits of butter over it; salt and pepper. Place some muffin rings in a dripping pan and lay the fish on to bake.
