Sir Genille Cave-Browne-Cave, the itinerant nobleman-janitor-soldier-cowboy-sailor-fortune hunter and sky pilot has won and will wed Miss Florence Boltwood in this little valley village of the Blue Ridge Hills, it was announced today.

After his checkered, not to say Scotch plaid career, Sir G. C-B-C got religion from his job as janitor of a Salvation Army hall in Manhattan, came here among the hills, met Miss Boltwood and started in to build a church and a romance, both of which are now about complete.

This man with two excavations and a color for a name, and the 12th baronet of his line, ran away from his home in Leicester, England when he was 13. He has since sailed the seven seas, fought insurrections in Egypt in which he was wounded and

captured by natives, fought London moneylenders, killed big game in India, wandered through the Orient, lost a fortune in San Francisco, dug ditches in Kansas City, was a cowboy in Texas, Oklahoma and Wyoming and became famous as a broncho buster at frontier exhibitions, returned to England, fought the money lenders again, then hurried back to New York, So matrimony holds no terrors for him.
