Lobsters May Thrive In West

University of Washington Has Eye
on Experiments in Growing Lob-
sters in the Sound.

University of Washington, Dec. 8.—
(Special)—A carload of lobsters,
shipped by the government across the
continent from Booth Bay, Me., was
freed recently among the San Juan
islands in Puget sound by Trevor Kin-
caid, head of the department of zool-
ogy. This is the third annual ship-
ment of the edible crustaceans to
these waters and is part of the gov-
ernment's attempt to cultivate lob-
sters on the Pacific coast.

A refrigerator car housed the lob-
sters during their transcontinental
tour. They were packed in boxes
with moist seaweed for filler and bore
up extremely well, according to Prof.
Kincaid. Only about five per cent of
the 6,000 died in transit. The re-
mainder took to the water as if they
felt at home, he said in discussing
their behavior.

A lobster industry will certainly be
built up in the northwest if the pro-
ject is a success, in the opinion of
Prof. Kincaid. Puget sound is par-
ticularly well adapted for the culture
of the lobsters because it approxi-
mates the natural habitat of the ani-
mals along the Atlantic, he says.
Furthermore, the old enemies of the
lobster are not found here. The water
is nearly the same temperature and
the food is similar.

The success of the previous ship-
ments cannot be accurately deter-
mined, says Prof. Kincaid. The lob-
ster is a submarine rover and speci-
mens of last year's carload might be
found in any part of the sound. This
disposition to scatter, together with
the high birth rate under favorable
conditions, extends the possibility of
building a lobster industry in the
northwest.

When three years old the lobster
lays its first eggs, a batch of about

25,000. By the time it is five years
old it lays annually about 50,000. The
mortality among the young is high,
according to Prof. Kincaid. Along
the Atlantic many fish, among them
the cod, prey upon the young before
they have developed their powerful
protective clam. After they have
reached maturity they are a good
match for most fishes.

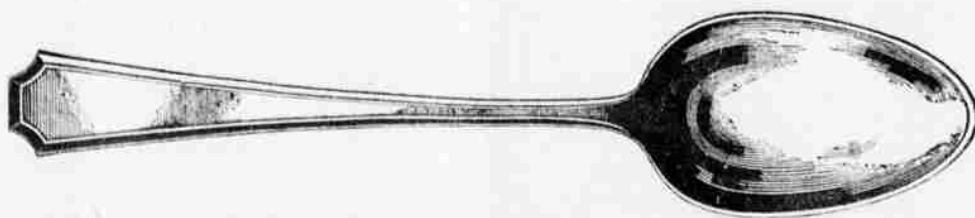
