# GIFTS FOR MOTHER

**T**HE last minute shopper or one who has almost forgotten some one in her Christmas list is often at her wits' end to think of something acceptable, and the gift is of more importance than the price. While the stores are full of shoppers she wanders bewildered among the host of presents on every side. Where one has to search it is best to begin early. A happy present for mother is a nest of tea tables, those long, narrow tables so proportioned that one is smaller than the other. They fit one under another. Beautiful ornaments for mother's hair lie enticingly on another counter. The cut shows two jeweled ones rather conservative in design. The stones are inlaid and delicate carvings are outlined with enamel in soft tones. A glittering array of crystal and glass greets the shopper and offers innumerable suggestions for really beau-



tiful Christmas gifts. White rock crystal pieces of great variety and in many sizes and prices compose one group; gold incrustated rock crystal pieces are included in a special group; cut glass pieces, most of them having the delicate, light cutting that looks like frost on the window pane, and Bohemian glass in white and gold, white and black, white and colors and in solid colors make up the collection. Muff foundations can be bought, from which a pretty, round muff may be quickly fashioned, for 24 cents to \$1.00. Hand woven linen pieces, embroidered by hand in rich and beautiful colors, are offered, Russian konstar work. The linen is white, gray, linen color



and dark brown, and the colors of the embroidery are sometimes very vivid, blue, red, orange, etc., and sometimes delicate or somber. Some of the pieces are embroidered in silver thread also, but the most characteristic ones have the deep and warm tones of coloring. Then comes china—beautiful odd pieces for fruit or entrees, delightful cups and saucers, ramekins and platters. The chocolate set pictured is of fine china decorated with a Japanese pattern in oriental blue, so cozy for winter afternoons and Sunday night suppers. The moderately priced foreign sets and pieces are lacking. American china manufacturers are running full speed to meet the opportunity open to supply china for ordinary use. They have improved their patterns. You will find in your rounds sets made in the east and middle west displaying attractive patterns, conservative and in good color. The supply of hand decorated china, studio made, is on the increase, with assurance of welcome. Pictured is a convenient white linen bag, embroidered with butterflies and scallops in king's blue, to hang on the butler's pantry door and hold soiled napkins till wash day.
