At a brief session of the city commission last evening numerous matters came up for consideration, among them further deliberation on the adjustment of petitions for new arc lights. Some have been distributed but the commission is going slowly in the matter to get the best possible results. By the time another meeting is held it is expected a final adjustment and distribution will have been made.

Baker Has Physical Director.

Baker, Dec. 14.—(Special)—A call was extended this week by the Y. M. C. A. board of directors to Lester Ellis, director of the Y. M. C. A. at Astoria, to act in the same capacity at the Baker association.

Mr. Ellis has written several letters to the officers of the local association and it is expected that he will accept the call, according to C. L. Shaw, secretary. Mr. Ellis will be

unable to leave his present post until a substitute has been secured.

Mr. Shaw has been in charge of the physical training department of the Baker Y. M. C. A. but the classes have grown to such an extent that there is now need of a man who can

devote his entire time to the work.
