General Manager's Report for the Week Ending December 9, 1916.

To the Commission:—The Street Superintendent's report for the week is as follows: Spent \$28.50 for team and driver; \$15 for white wing; \$1 for repairs. We made a general clean up of all catch basins, stored flusher and sprinkler in the tool house; cleaned the snow from the sidewalks.

The Water Superintendent's report for the week is as follows: Spent \$95.15 on 12-inch sewer at Second street crossing; \$5.25 repairing leaks on B. C. line; \$5.50 on a tap at 2508 Fourth street, and \$2.75 for repair work.

The City Treasurer's report for the week is as follows: Receipts, \$75 for leather belt sold out of the water department; \$24.81 for old iron sold out of the water department; \$954.74 water rents; \$206.14 interest on assessments; \$289.24 installments on assessments, and 50 cents for one election permit. Disbursements: \$502.55 water warrants paid; \$75 Improvement Bond Interest paid; \$1250.41 General Fund warrants paid with \$151.95 interest on same; \$50 park warrant paid, and \$3.25 Library warrant paid.

The City Recorder's report for the week is as follows: Received 50 cents for one building permit. Issued warrants as follows: \$1241.67 for salaries allowed; \$530.28 for labor certificates allowed; \$3.25 on the park fund per voucher No. 79, and \$50 on the park fund per voucher No. 80.

Pennsylvania Legislature Will Argue "Progressive" Legislation

Harrisburg, Pa., Dec. 15.—(United Press)—Pennsylvania's biennial general assembly, when it convenes in January, probably will spend most of its time arguing over "progressive" laws which now exist.

In 1913 and 1915 many "progressive" laws were enacted—child labor, female labor, workman's compensation, elections. Many amendments will be proposed, some from friends; some from enemies. The "progressive" elements of all parties are likely to find their hands full preserving the spirit of the laws as they exist.

Governor Martin G. Brumbaugh will endeavor to have a housing bill added to the list. It will be his second and last legislature.

Senator Boies Penrose, while still the recognized Republican leader of the State, has nothing but the title. He is without patronage—federal, state or city. Congressman William S. Vare and his brother, State Senator Edwin H. Vare, control the Philadelphia city administration. Governor Brumbaugh is aligned with them. A warm fight is in prospect over organization of the Legislature. Upon the result may depend the political future of Penrose, although he has five years yet to serve at Washington. The session will be engaged with the biennial battle for passage of a county local option bill on the liquor licenses in Pennsylvania now is exclusively in the hands of the judges of the courts of the several counties.
