TWO BIG REAL ESTATE DEALS

C. A. Hunter Buys the Harris Farm and Mr. Murdock the Opera House.

One of the largest real estate deals made this year in this end of the country was closed up this week, when C. A. Hunter bought the Harris farm adjoining the city limits, on the east, from Mrs. Rhoda B. Marks as administratrix of the Harris estate. The deal was made through L. Couch, the real estate man.

The farm consists of 250 acres of irrigated land and is considered one of the best producing farms in this end of the valley.

We understand that Mr. Hunter is to make this farm the home of his fine Hereford herd in connection with his large hill farm, a part of which he uses for early opening pasture where the bunch grass grows in abundance.

This farm is known to the old settlers as the Standley farm.

This week Mr. Couch also closed the deal whereby Avreil Combs be-

comes the owner of 480 acres of farm land on Day Ridge near the Grande Ronde river, about 36 miles north of Wallowa, owned by Harry L. Murdock.

Mr. Combs turned in on the deal as part payment the Wallowa Opera house.

Mr. Murdock will take possession of the playhouse the first of the new year. Mr. Combs will not farm his new holdings this year, as he has a saw mill over in Idaho which he will continue to run next season.

Borrowing Trouble.

Nothing is magnified so easily as difficulty. There are whole lots of people going through. The world paying heavy rates of compound interest in advance on borrowed trouble, and the peculiar phase of the transaction is that they don't get the particular lot of trouble they borrow. Borrowed trouble is of no earthly good and the courage that meets, fights and conquers circumstances when they come, is a better variety than that which fights before the battle field is reached and yields exhausted ere the fight is on.—Salem Capital Journal.
