Vale Wants Better Service.

Salem, Jan. 3.—(Special)—Citizens of Vale have presented a petition asking the public service commission to restrain the Oregon Short Line railroad from putting into effect its order to discontinue on Saturday, December 23, the morning and evening trains and also the Sunday train from that point. It is alleged the discontinuance of these trains will work a hardship on the town, and compel the people to stop over night and Sunday at a town 16 miles away.

This condition has been caused by the railroad extending its line to Crane, about 150 miles farther south than Vale. The train schedule that is now in effect is suited to the other towns on the line but is bad for Vale. F. H. Knickerbocker, of the O. S. L., declares that the people of Vale insist on a service that is entirely unprofit-

able for the railroad. A hearing is asked as it is stated the train could not earn more than 10c or 15c a train mile. The new schedule will remain in effect until the commission changes it.

MINNESOTA POTATO KINGS

MEET TO TALK OF SPUDS
St. Paul, Minn., Jan. 3.—(United Press)—Aristocratic spuds that sell for \$2 and \$3 a bushel here now, were the subject of much discussion when the Minnesota Potato Growers association went into its second annual session at the Minnesota university farm. Topics of discussion this afternoon were strangely minus the dollar mark. Members of the association enriched by their combination to hold potatoes for a certain price, created a stir in the capitol city by their prosperous appearance today.

NO MIXTURES FOR ROAD RACERS

"All but three of the sixteen contestants in the recent Douglas to Phoenix road race took particular pains to secure straight-distilled, all-refinery gasoline, and the winners of first, second and third places were among the wise thirteen," said C. GREATEST AUTO SHOW TO OPEN ON SATURDAY

New York, Jan. 3.—(United Press)—The greatest auto show in the world according to all advance indications, will open Saturday in Grand Central Palace, New York, to continue one week.

While monster exhibitions of automobiles and accessories were held in London, Berlin and Paris before the war, it is the opinion everywhere that the forthcoming show will eclipse anything the world ever has seen. It certainly will be more of an American show than any other ever held, for American manufacturers will be represented almost solely.

The show will be the seventeenth annual exhibition to be held under the auspices of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, Inc.

Exhibitors will include besides those who make automobiles from the tires to the tops, the small accessory manufacturer, and the sideline salesman.

There will be many new cars on exhibition, but the main group will include products of those manufacturers whose plants have been the basis of the growth of the automobile industry.

Every one of the sixteen types of bodies, and every price at which cars can be obtained will be represented. There are few changes in body design, the main upsets being in motor construction. Twelves, eights, sixes, and fours, representing the various styles of motor construction, will be present in profusion to cough and splutter their merits to the visitors.

Sixteen types of bodies, designated as roadsters, coupelet, coupe, convertible coupe, cloverleaf, touring car, salon touring car, convertible touring car, sedan, convertible sedan, open sedan, limousine, open limousine, berline, brougham and landaulet, will be on display.

Devices and accessories will be given space on the second floor of the palace. More than 225 exhibitors of this class of automobile products will have booths.
