To Form Farm Loan Branch.

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 8.—(Special)—Application will be made immediately by the National Farm Loan association of Clarke county to the regional farm bank, located at Spokane, for a charter for the local organization, under the farm loan act.

The local organization, which was formed on December 16, and officers chosen at that time met Saturday in the rooms of the Vancouver Chamber of Commerce to make further preparations to organize the association. The new farm loan plan is meeting with general favor among farmers in Clarke county and it was decided at the last meeting to make application for a loan of \$114,500. This will undoubtedly be increased at the coming meeting.

HOPES TO SAVE THE BABIES

Representative Linthicum Seeks to Enlist Public Support of Bill

To the Editor:

The American Federation of labor, at its recent meeting in Baltimore, where 2,000,000 Labor men and their families were represented, adopted the enclosed resolution by and overwhelming vote.

As Thousands of our Babies are dying annually from the cause stated in this resolution, I hope you can find time and space to refer to this grave subject in your editorial columns.

I seek your support in arousing the public to the terrible conditions which exist in the production and distribution of our dairy products.

More children, not to mention the adults, die from bovine tuberculosis Every Year than from the infantile paralysis outbreak, which caused such a panic last summer.

My resolution (H. Res. 137) does not call for immediate legislation but a thorough investigation of the actual conditions surrounding the production and distribution of dairy products, to the end that following legislation will be intelligently framed upon actual facts.

I will appreciate it if you will send me marked copy or clipping of such reference as you may make.

RESOLUTION

Adopted by the Thirty-sixth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Labor Held in Baltimore, Md., November, 1916.

Resolution No. 137—By Delegate John H. Ferguson of the Baltimore Federation of Labor.

Whereas, Hon. J. Charles Linthicum, of Maryland, has introduced in the House of Representatives a resolution (H. R. 137) providing for the appointment by the Speaker of a committee of five members of the House, whose duty it shall be to investigate and report as speedily as practicable as follows:

(a) Whether conditions prevailing in dairies and dairy products seriously menace the health and property of the people of the United States.

(b) Whether Federal inspection and supervision, either alone or in cooperation with State and municipal inspection and supervision, is necessary to the reasonable protection of the health and property of the citizens of the United States.

(c) If so, then the best and most economic methods of inaugurating and enforcing such inspection and supervision; and

Whereas, A hearing was had on H. R. 137 on April 11, 1916, before the Committee on Rules of the House of Representatives, at which time Dr. E. C. Schroeder, expert bacteriologist of the Department of Agriculture, stated to the committee that 300 children die annually in New York City of bovine tuberculosis and on this basis the annual death rate in the United States from bovine tuberculosis is 6,000 children every year; and further said that over 9 per cent., or 2,000,000 of our dairy cows have tuberculosis, and are capable of transmitting that disease to children while Dr. John R. Mohler, assistant chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, told the committee that he had personally examined the bodies of a number of children who died of tuberculosis and found that over 22 per cent. had died of bovine tuberculosis; and

Whereas, "The Forecaster" of December, 1915, page 399, says: "Other investigations—have proved with

equal conclusiveness that children are the chief sufferers from the bovine type of tuberculosis, which is so prevalent in cattle that it is useless to think of its immediate eradication. The only protection for our children, until this is accomplished, is pasteurization, we are responsible for the slaughter of innocents compared with which that of Herod was a trifle; and many of those whom we do not kill we maim and cripple for life, for the deadly tubercle bacillus attacks the bones, joints and glands of the unhappy little ones rather than their lungs; and

Whereas, If these charges are true then it is the duty of Congress to investigate and to pass such legislation as may be necessary to remedy the evil; and if they are untrue, then Congress should, by proper investigation, show this to be the fact, that the uncertainty now prevalent among our citizens may be alleviated and the real facts known, so that the people may freely and unceasingly avail themselves without fear and trembling of this splendid product, the most nutritious, useful and, when produced and distributed under proper sanitary methods, the most healthful of all; therefore be it

Resolved, That this convention of the American Federation of Labor favors an investigation of the changes made against milk and milk products, and gives it approval to House

Resolution No. 137 and be further Resolved, That the Secretary of the American Federation of Labor is instructed to communicate our action to each of the gentlemen composing the committee on Rules of the House of Representatives, urging a favorable report on H. R. 137; and be it further Resolved, That the Legislative Committee of the American Federation of Labor be instructed to do all things necessary to bring to pass the speedy passage of this resolution.

GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE**URGES COLONIZATION**

Sacramento, Jan. 8.—(United Press)—With the development and colonization of California's agricultural lands as the chief business at hand the state legislature convened here today. Governor Hiram W. Johnson, United States senator-elect, emphasized the importance of this work in his message to the lawmakers. The Water problems conference, appointed by the governor, called attention to the vast possibilities of the state's water resources which, it was pointed out, can be made a source of great wealth to the state. The greater portion of the great Sacramento valley for instance, is not being cultivated because there is no method of water storage for irrigation.
