RAISING GREAT PENSION FUND FOR CLERGYMEN

Protestant Episcopal Church Collecting \$5,000,000 in All Parts of the Country.

One of the most progressive steps in church administration will be put into effect by the Protestant Episcopal church on Feb. 1, 1917, when the pension system for aged clergymen of that faith goes into effect. The authorities of that church are gathering a fund of \$5,000,000 to establish the pensions on a sound basis, and already \$3,500,000 has been contributed by Episcopalians throughout the country.

Bishop William Lawrence of Massachusetts, chairman of the committee which is raising the pension fund, during a recent sermon at St. Thomas' church, New York city, said in part:

"It has been said that corporations have no souls, but every one knows that corporations are composed of men and women with hearts, sympathies and a sense of justice.

"The question arising among them today is whether it is just or wise to take the life service of a man at a salary fixed so as to support him and his family, but which will not allow him to lay up anything for old age, when he will have to fall back upon charity. "The nation has answered these questions by pension systems for the officers of the army and navy and their widows. Many corporations are answering them by the creation of systems of pensions, or, rather, deferred salaries, for their employees, amounts laid up for the future whose payments are deferred until retirement in old age. "The Protestant Episcopal church has responded to this call of justice. A pension system has been formed whereby through premiums paid annually by each and every parish the people will lay up money in a central pension fund which, when the rector retires at sixty-eight, will give him an annuity, not of charity, but with self respect—a deferred salary. An annuity is given too in case of disability in the midst of active service and an annuity also to his widow.

"The system is actuarially and financially sound. The one condition is that a reserve fund of \$5,000,000, to meet the accrued liabilities and to enable the older men now in active service to be pensioned, be raised before the system is put into operation. March 1, 1917, is the date set for the starting of the system. On that date the church expects the \$5,000,000 to be in hand. "The fund has passed the \$3,500,000 mark, and for the next ninety days the church throughout the whole country will gather its forces together to gather in the last \$1,500,000 and to carry the sum as far beyond the \$5,000,000 mark as a sense of justice, generosity and enthusiasm will carry it. Every dollar added to the \$5,000,000 gives to the system added strength and elasticity.

"This pension system of the Episcopal church, sound in every point, is in the van of pension systems, so that in its creation the church will offer leadership, not only to other churches, but to corporations, states and cities, which within a generation will enter upon the work of creating systems for the pensioning of those who have given their lives in service."

Majority Leader Kitchin estimated the deficit at \$490,000,000. No decision was reached. The committee meets again Thursday.
