"GOOD SPORTSMAN" VAN KNOWN HERE

Fandom lost a real friend and booster early yesterday morning in the death of E. B. Van Arnan, known all along the Pacific coast as a baseball player and more recently as a trapshooter. Mr. Van Arnan had been engaged in sporting goods business in Portland for several years. Mr. Van Arnan is well known in La Grande, particularly to the shooting fraternity. Chief Lou Rayburn of the La Grande police counted "Van" as his personal friend.
It was more than 18 years ago "Van" as he was more familiarly known, played third base on the Minneapolis baseball team under the name of Billy Levan and later he was a star baseball player around Los Angeles and San Diego.
He was a good trapshooter and was capable of turning in scores of better than 90 per cent. He became ill at the big shoot at Everding Park traps of the Portland Gun club last September. He was a member of the Portland Gun club and the Woodmen of the World.
He is survived by a widow and son, Wilbert; a brother, W. J. Van Arnan, of Omaha, Neb., and two sisters, Mrs. Edith Rudioux, of Omaha, and Mrs. A. R. Sauer, of San Diego.

New Irrigation Law Proposed.
Salem, Ore., Jan. 13.—(Special)—The redrafted irrigation district law favored by the state irrigation congress which contains many important changes from the present statutes, and provides for the application of the irrigation district plan to United States reclamation service projects, will probably come before the house of representatives through the irrigation communities early next week.
Edward E. Taylor, attorney of the United States reclamation service, was in Salem Wednesday conferring with Percy Cupper, assistant state engineer, who was chairman of the committee appointed by the Oregon Irrigation congress to draw the new laws, completing the details of the act.
