Protests Evasion of Liquor Law

The Circuit Judge of his district clearly reflected the sentiment of the people when he called the attention of the new Grand Jury to the liquor affidavit situation. If the current reports are true there has been a widespread concerted movement to evade the law and to secure a stock of intoxicant upon false affidavits. The statute is clear and expressly limits the individual to a specific quantity of liquor per month. It means that he shall receive no more. The affidavit which is required is a personal one and under every reasonable intentment cannot be made under an assumed name. Neither is it probably that the statutory right to secure intoxicants for personal use can be exercised for others. The Grand Jury will do well to give the suggestions of the judge full consideration and to institute prompt, vigorous and thorough investigation.—Pendleton Tribune.
