terms but merely stated the entente's conquest aims.

The note is regarded as confirmation of the Allies' conspiracy to crush Germany.

General opinion is that further peace moves are not likely until the spring offensive.

Considerable interest is taken in the British colonial premiers' conference in London. This conference is believed significant on account of the colonials' heavy western front losses.

LADIES TO AID AT BANQUET

Donohue, Mrs. George T. Cochran, and Mrs. E. Polack were present as a committee from the Club, of which Mrs. Donohue is chairman, to arrange for their part in the heavy work which the visit of the convention will necessitate.

The ladies first had a meeting with the banquet committee of which T. J. Scroggin is chairman and discussed the plans for the serving of the big banquet which will be the feature of the second day of the convention and one of the big entertainment features. Plans are being made for serving a banquet for 500 and any one who ever tackled a job like that knows that Mr. Scroggin was relieved when the ladies told him that they would help in the management of the big undertaking. And that they would have their whole organization back of them. The banquet will be served at Zuber's hall and it will be some banquet.

The ladies will also serve a luncheon to the visiting ladies the first day of the convention, April 24, and will look after the reception and entertainment of ladies who come to the convention, during their stay.

At last night's meeting of the executive committee the following were present: J. G. Snodgrass, chairman, George T. Cochran, T. J. Scroggin, C. D. Emahiser, A. C. Hampton, Linden McCullough, F. E. Stilwell, chairman of the entertainment committee, and Clarke Leiter.

The meeting discussed the general features of the entertainment program that is being formed and a dance was suggested as one of the entertainment features in addition to the school entertainment, the cowboy breakfast, the livestock exhibit, parade, banquet, luncheon to the ladies, smoker, and other features that are being planned.

Last night the organization of the executive committee was completed by the adoption of the following resolution drafted by George T. Cochran, chairman of the resolutions committee:

Resolution.

Be it resolved by the general committee appointed to arrange for the entertainment of the Cattle & Horse Raisers' association convention, to be held at La Grande, April 24 and 25, 1917, that the following sub-committees be appointed: Decoration committee, room committee, stock exhibit committee, finance committee, executive board. That the duties of each of the committees shall be as follows:

Decoration Committee.

The decoration committee shall see to the decoration of the streets with flags and streamers and hire such men as may be necessary to have the decoration done, and shall further see that all the streets and business houses of the city decorate their stores, windows and buildings to correspond with the spirit of the occasion.

Room Committee.

The room committee shall make a list of all rooms available in the city, together with the prices of each room, and shall take such steps as may be necessary to have private families list available rooms with them. Such room committee shall work in conjunction with the hotels of the city, and the hotels may have the list of rooms so secured by such committee at their disposal, for the purpose of taking care of such guests as they may not be able to accommodate in the hotel proper. The committee shall see that all visitors to the convention are provided with suitable and proper accommodations.

Stock Exhibit Committee.

The stock exhibit committee shall secure a place for a stock exhibit, preferably the fair grounds, and at a sufficient time prior to the convention; the committee shall secure pledges from stockmen to place a sufficient number of stock on exhibition to make the exhibit worth while to see. As an inducement for such exhibit, the committee shall have at the disposal of the exhibitors, free of all charge to them, all the hay, grain and straw that is necessary to feed and take care of the stock placed on exhibit. The committee shall further provide the men necessary to keep the stables clean and to handle the hay.

Finance Committee.

The finance committee shall take the necessary steps to raise by subscription the sum of \$2000, and pay same to the treasurer of the general committee. After the convention is over the treasurer shall submit his accounts, together with the vouchers, to the finance committee, and such finance committee shall audit the same and make proper report of such audit.

Banquet Committee.

The banquet committee shall secure a proper place for a banquet to the members of the association, and see that such banquet is properly served on the evening of the second day of the convention; such banquet shall be open only to the delegates to the convention, their wives, and such other persons as the banquet committee may designate, and such banquet committee shall adopt such means as may be necessary for carrying out the spirit of the entertainment which has always been the pride and honor of the city of La Grande. The banquet committee shall also cooperate with any committee of ladies that may be

appointed in providing luncheons, and other means of entertainment for visiting ladies to the convention.

Entertainment Committee.

(1) The entertainment committee shall provide for the necessary advertisement and publicity work of the convention.

(2) Shall provide and make arrangements for the usual excursion passenger rates, and the usual stock exhibit rates that are granted by the railroad companies for such gatherings and exhibits.

(3) Shall provide the necessary program of speakers, shows, circuses, receptions and dances, to the end, that the hospitality of La Grande shall not be forgotten by the delegates.

(4) Inasmuch as a cowboy breakfast was served at Baker last year, and that it is one item that should properly become an annual event of the Stock Raisers convention, this committee shall put on a cowboy breakfast at the exhibit pavilion on the second morning of the convention, which breakfast shall begin at 7 o'clock in the morning, so that the delegates to the convention will have ample opportunity to view some of the fine stock which helps make Union county prosperous.

(5) This committee shall secure a place to hold the convention, which place shall not be allowed to present any bill to the convention.

(6) This committee shall send invitations to the governors of Idaho, Oregon and Washington, and if possible, secure the attendance of the three governors.

Reception Committee.

The whole general committee together with any additional appointees shall form the reception committee.

This committee shall dress in uniforms of white similar to the white flannel heretofore worn by the members of the Elks lodge, on various occasions. They shall secure a pledge of all the autos in La Grande for free use during the convention in "joy riding" for the delegates and visitors to the convention. The committee shall meet all trains beginning with No. 18 on the 23rd day of April, 1917. This committee shall secure the necessary badges of the association colors, to furnish each delegate and others entitled thereto, with such badges, and in addition to such badges shall secure a number of souvenirs to present to the delegates.

Executive Committee (Board).

The executive board shall consist of a president, secretary and treasurer, of the general committee, and it is the duty of the executive board to O. K., and authorize the expenditure of all money, and no money shall be expended or any bill contracted by any person in the name of this committee unless such bill has been O. K.'d by the executive board, and no bill of this committee shall be paid until such O. K. has been secured.

General Committee.

It is the duty of each committee, upon entering upon its duties to make an estimate of the money required by such committee, in order to accomplish the results desired by this general committee. This estimate shall be transmitted by such committee to the treasurer of the general committee, and by him made up into a statement, and such statement shall constitute the budget of this general committee to guide it in its expenditures. In case such estimates are more than the amount set by these resolutions

for the finance committee to raise, then upon the order of the executive board, the finance committee shall raise, by subscription, any deficiency that there might be between the amount herein described and the budget as established.
