JAPANESE SEEKS TO CEMENT FRIENDSHIP WITH ITS OLD FOE

Viscount Uchida Is Appointed Ambassador to Russia. With a View of Strengthening Alliance Recently Concluded.

Tokio, Jan. 18.—(United Press by Mail)—Chosen with the idea that he will further the cause of friendship between Japan and Russia and strengthen the alliance recently concluded between the two erstwhile enemies, Viscount Yasuya Uchida, ambassador to the United States in 1909-11, has been appointed as the new Japanese envoy to Russia.

Viscount Uchida fills the post made vacant when Viscount Motono was recalled to accept the position of foreign minister in the new Terauchi ministry. Besides his term in Washington he has acted as ambassador to Vienna, minister to China and was foreign minister in 1911. He is considered one of the most able diplomats in Japan.

Politicians in Tokio take the conclusion of the Russo-Japanese pact last spring as the beginning of a long term of friendly political and commercial relations between the two countries. But it is generally believed that only a beginning has been made. There is a generally accepted belief that Russia requested Japan to wait until the close of the war for signature of additional clauses of the new convention.

Viscount Motono is given the credit for laying the foundation of the alliance with Russia. His service as foreign minister is expected to be marked with pro-Russian tendencies. Upon Viscount Uchida, however, is placed the responsibility of promoting relations in Petrograd, so that after the war, as well as the present, the two nations will be best aligned for the interests of the Far East.

Cupid Has an Ally In Chicago Woman

Chicago, Jan. 18.—(United Press.)—Cupid, and girls who overlooked their chance last year, have an ardent ally today in Mrs. Elizabeth Guion Dornier, corresponding secretary of the Chicago Social Club. Her duties are to bring sighing swains and blushing maidens, who otherwise might never meet, together. Object, matrimony.

The chief aim of the club, however, is to establish a middle course between the expensive clubs and cheap cabarets. The first meeting of the organization was attended by 100 doctors, lawyers, dentists, students, department store clerks and stenographers.

DEMANDS BRITAIN "COME FROM UNDER THE TABLE" WITH ITS NAVAL POLICY

Manchester, Eng., Jan. 6.—(United Press by Mail)—The British government's cancellation of the American \$60,000,000 munitions contract justifies a sterner British naval policy the Manchester Daily Dispatch suggests editorially.

The cancellation means more than that Great Britain has overtaken her requirements in the way of becoming independent of American aid, the paper says.

"We do not under value American help in this war," it says. "Without it we should have been at a serious disadvantage. But America has provided us with munitions for the sake of our good graces. Every shell, every gun and every machine tool has had to be paid for, or will inevitably have to be, in goods or gold."

"But that is not all. Almost from the beginning of the war we have had dinned into our ears that we must adopt a 'pussy-footed' gait in our exercise of seapower, lest we put up the backs of the Americans and cause them to shut down their supply of munitions. Now that we are getting into a position in which we can do without American help, it is to be hoped that our diplomacy will pluck up enough courage to come from under the table."

Street Assessment Case Now Reopened

Judge Knowles Asked to Reconsider Case in Which He Held Street Assessment Prior.

Judge Knowles has denied a motion filed by defendant for a new trial in the case of Thomas Morgan against James Johns, of Pendleton, in which Morgan recovered a judgment for \$5800, for alleged conversion of some stock in a farming corporation. The case has been appealed to the supreme court by Mr. Johns.

A hearing is being held today before Court Reporter Hanna as referee in connection with the objections of a number of creditors of the Metzler Hegstead Lumber company, a bankrupt lumber partnership of North Powder, to the final account of W. A. Hudelson, of that place, as receiver.

Grand Ronde Cash Company Warehouse Property Has Been Filed with Judge Knowles.

The judge recently decided that the lien of the street assessments of La Grande, though made after the mortgage, was ahead of it, and that the lien of personal property tax taxed by the county against the real property would have been ahead of both, had the law authorizing such action not been passed a later date than the giving of the mortgage. The latter question the judge is asked to reconsider in a brief filed by attorneys for the county.

The city of Cove recently lost in the preliminaries in the action wherein the city was justified in taking up two cows running at large on its streets, under an ordinance passed by its council in an action of replevin, brought by the owner to secure possession. The court holds that the charter of Cove did not give the city power to impound such stock. The matter came before Judge Knowles a second time recently and he again ruled that Cove's ordinance was passed without power. Jury trial will be had in February.

Tickers Will Call Senators To Work

Washington, Jan. 18.—(U. P.)—Tick! Tick! Tick! "No Quorum—the doorkeeper will lock the doors, the sergeant-at-arms (via the tickler) will notify the absentees and the clerk will call the roll." And the "absentees", reclining in their private offices in the Senate office building, several blocks from the capitol, will glance at the tape and hurry, via their subterranean passageway, to the Senate chamber to answer "present."

This will be the future procedure in the upper house of Congress, and possibly the lower, if plans being formulated today carry. The Senate chamber is to be connected up with the Senate office building, across the way, with a regular "ticker" service, as are stock brokerage offices.
