Watch the Waste Help Save Paper

Dear Reader:—There is a paper famine in this country. Your individual help is needed to stop it. If you will watch this little box every day we will try to tell you how you can do that. We used to import 50 per cent of the rags and old paper used in making news paper, wrapping paper writing paper, cardboards, all kinds of paper. The war has stopped that supply. In consequence, paper prices have gone up, in some instances 400 per cent. Retail stores can help by posting notices tasking customers not to insist on having parcels wrapped up if they can be conveniently handled otherwise. Customers can help by acting on one suggestion. Housewives can help by saving rags and waste paper, bundling them up and selling them to the junk man. Tomorrow we will tell you some of the kinds of rags most in demand, and why.

Carrier Pigeons.

The carrier pigeon has wonderfully developed the "homing" instinct possessed by many domestic animals. The young birds are set free at short distances from home and of their own accord fly directly back. The distances are gradually increased, and a well trained bird will "home" swiftly and accurately over 500 or 600 miles, carrying messages on the lightest of paper (attached to the bird's leg) at a sustained speed of thirty to forty miles an hour.

The KITCHEN CUPBOARD

TASTY MEATS.

LIVER IN CHUTNEY BUTTER SAUCE.—Wash and boil two pounds of calf's liver until quite tender; then break it up with a silver fork. Melt and have ready a half pint of butter, adding to it the juice of an onion, a saltspoonful each of pepper and salt, a tablespoonful of chutney sirup and a teaspoonful of chopped tarragon leaves. Add the liver and beat, but do not boil. Garnish with toast and dress.

Beef Sausage.—To one pound of clear suet add two pounds of lean beef. Clear the suet from the skin and chop suet and beef very fine; season with a teaspoonful of finely powdered sage, a saltspoonful of thyme, a saltspoonful of pepper and a teaspoonful of salt. Mix and mold into flat cakes and fry a delicate brown. A little onion juice may be added to the sausage meat if liked.

Sour Roast.—Select a good piece of top sirloin weighing four or five pounds; have it larded with a little salt pork, then rolled and wrapped in thin slices in lard and tied. Lay it on the grating of the pot roast pot and cover it with a sliced carrot, a sliced raw potato, half a cupful of chopped celery, a thinly sliced onion, half a bud of garlic, a bay leaf, three cloves, six raisins, a cupful of vinegar, three lumps of sugar and enough water to nearly cover the meat. Cover the pot tightly and cook evenly, turning the meat once during the cooking, for three hours. Just before it is done add a saltspoonful of pepper and half a teaspoonful of salt. Lift the meat and strain the gravy and return the gravy to the pot and thicken it with browned flour mixed with water. Add a dozen seedless raisins and serve hot.

Pot Roast.—Take two pounds veal or beef, cut into small cubes and place a layer of the meat in a small bean pot. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and flour, then a layer of sliced onion and tomato (canned) and so on until dish is full; fill with cold water, cover and bake slowly all day.

FricateLL.—Grind pork tenderloin fine in a meat chopper. Season with salt and pepper, grated onion and a bit of powdered sage. Take half as much bread as meat, soak the crumbs until soft, squeeze dry and mix with the meat. Add one or two unbeaten eggs to bind. Shape into small flat cakes, dredge with flour and fry.

SHEEP RAISING.

In his annual report, just prepared, the secretary of agriculture recommends that sheep be raised more extensively as a source of meat and wool and also as a means of using much of the waste land on farms. He points out that in the United States only one in seven farms of over twenty acres now supports sheep, with an average of one sheep of shearing age to three acres of land. The 300,000,000 pounds of wool now imported annually, he says, could be secured from 50,000,000 sheep, and this number could be added to our stock if a fourth of the remaining farms sustained one sheep for each three acres. The report also discusses the development which has taken place in the dairy industry and calls attention to the fact that cheese making, which heretofore has been limited to certain sections, can be extended successfully to the mountain regions of the south, to the valleys of the Rocky mountains and to many sections of the Pacific coast.

Oyster Cocktail.

One tablespoonful lemon juice, one tablespoonful Worcestershire sauce, two tablespoonfuls tomato ketchup, one teaspoonful salt, two tablespoonfuls grated horseradish, one-half teaspoonful paprika and dash of cayenne pepper. Mix all ingredients thoroughly and serve in small dish in center of the plate and the oysters on shells around.
