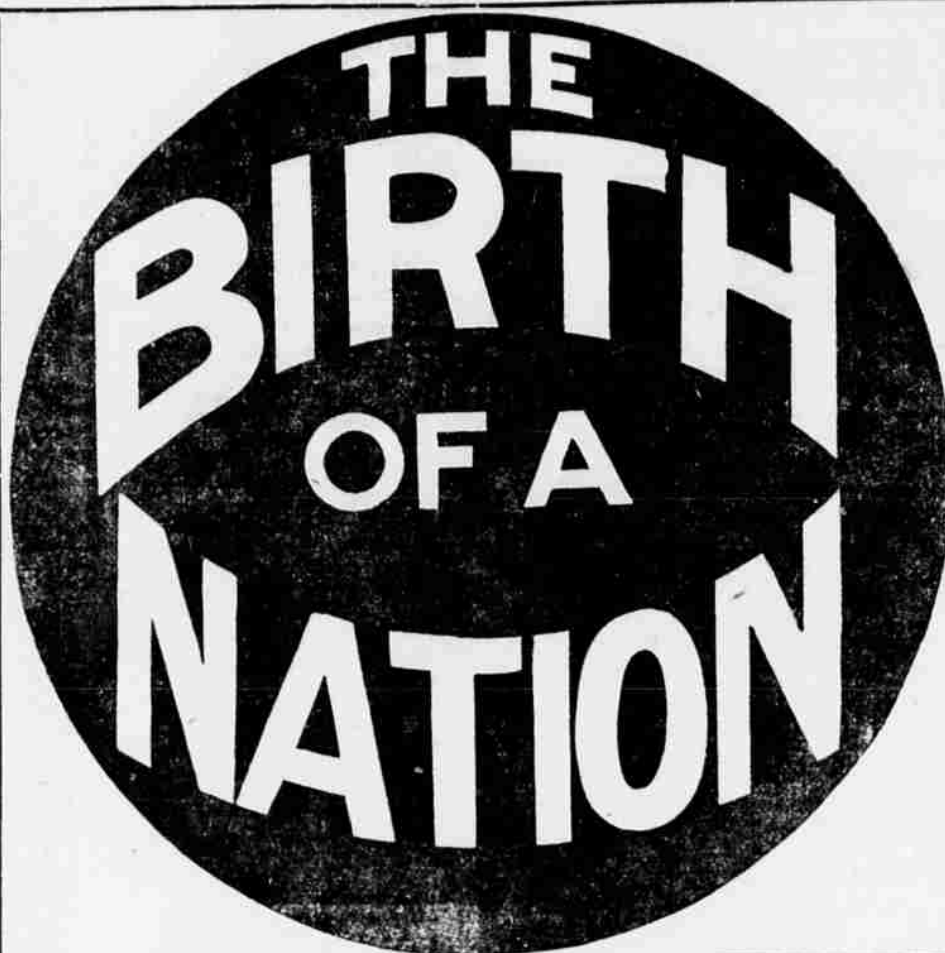

Want Better Service Can You Blame Them

If It Took You 40 Hours to Make 16-Mile Round Trip Wouldn't You "Holler?"

Supposing you lived 16 miles away from a bustling city and wanted to get in, now and then, to transact business. Supposing you had to spend 40 hours and five minutes to get to that bustling city, do an hour's business, say with a banker, and then go home. Now wouldn't you "holler?"

The above is the plight of the people of Imbler. There's no "supposin'" in their case. It's plain fact. Imbler and all the people along the Elgin and Joseph branch line want better service. They say they are going to keep "hollerin'" until they get it.

You see Imbler is just 16 miles distant from La Grande. In summer the farmers' Fords, and more pretentious cars, just "ramble" right into the city—well oftentimes faster than they should. But in winter the only hope is the O-W. branch line. It runs once a day.

Since hypotheses are the fashion in this story listen to this one:

Suppose Mr. X of Imbler has three calls to make in La Grande: at the banker's, the physician's and the land office. He leaves Imbler at 5:50 tonight. He arrives in La Grande at 6:25 tonight. The fare is but 70 cents the round trip. He stays, eats dinner at a La Grande hotel. At nine tomorrow morning he sees the physician; at ten, the banker; at 10:30, the register of the land office. At 11 he is ready to go home.

But his train left at 9:20. The next train is tomorrow at 9:20. Mr. X is obliged to remain in La Grande from 11 this morning until 9:20 tomorrow morning. When he does get away tomorrow morning here is what his expense account shows: round trip fare, 70 cents; five meals at 40 cents, \$2; two nights in hotel, \$2; 22 hours and 20 minutes wasted—a total actual expense of \$4.70 and a potential loss of one day. When he gets on the train tomorrow morning he will be home in 35 minutes. For 22 hours and 20 minutes he was "stranded," just 35 minutes from home. Mr. X undoubtedly will think on the way home tomorrow morning. In fact, he has already thought. Sherwood Williams, cashier of the State Bank of Imbler, thought these things Wednesday while waiting

to get home. Edwin Morrison has been thinking—and talking about this same thing for some time. Finally others are thinking; maybe it's the railroad's turn next.

Forestry Delegates Plan to Save Forests

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—(United Press)—Prepared to fight spread of the white pine blister disease that threatens \$365,000,000 worth of timber in New England and other northwestern states, delegates to the International Conference of the American Forestry association gathered here today.

Quarantines to check the dreadful disease were suggested by experts in attendance. By these white pine seedlings and currant and gooseberry bushes on which the fungus feeds would not be permitted to be shipped from infected states. This method has met with the approval of the department of agriculture, which has urged a quarantine to protect \$105,000,000 worth of sugar pines in western states.

Kaiser Mustache Club is Formed

Barberton, O., Jan. 19.—(United Press)—It seems both fitting and just that the first "Kaiser's Mustache Club" in the United States should be formed here in Barberton. To which the barber of Barberton agrees. Ten Barberton men organized it; and the only qualification for membership is a mustache a la Wilhelm. The club is, one might say, a growing institution.

Plan for American Merchant Marine.

Columbus, O., Jan. 19.—(United Press)—A plan whereby Uncle Sam could build an American merchant marine by passing laws that would insure investors in American ship securities a reasonable rate of interest, will be outlined to the Ohio Manufacturers' association here today by President S. W. Hastings of the Illinois Manufacturers' association.
