### She Sets Scriptural Verses Against War

Mrs. Eunice Wheeler Proctor of La Grande Quotes Biblical Verses Magnifying Peace.

In asking The Observer to print her arrangement of Scripture in verse, as opposed to war, Mrs. Eunice Wheeler Proctor wrote the following letter:
