### Hilton's Garage Is Opened For Business

Building Contains Conveniences for Patrons — Latest Appliances for Care of Machines Installed.

Hilton's Garage, 1412-1416 Adams avenue, was opened for business yesterday morning. The building is one of the best equipped in the state for handling automobiles and other motor vehicles.

There is a ground space of 110 by 100 feet divided into office room, repairing room, storage room, washing room and show and painting room.

In the office is a sample accessory display. The main accessory stock is kept in the darkened basement. The machinery is placed in one end of the repairing room and an overhead track permits a machine or engine to be lifted and carried to the machines. The storage room is well lighted by day or night and in the washing room is a rack upon which the machine is placed. This rack permits the washer to reach under parts of the machine more easily than before. Hot and cold water for washing is available. The show room can be made dust tight and inasmuch as the show room is also used as the painting room, this feature will enable the workman to do a better job of painting than heretofore.

Over the office is the vulcanizing room where all kinds of tire and casing "trouble" can be handled.

Off the office is the women's rest room. Here are comfortable chairs and magazines. There is a lavatory equipped with a dresser, comb and brush—and yes, Mrs. Hilton thought of it, Frank didn't—individual powder puffs.

A men's lavatory is placed just off the machinery room.

### ORIENTALS TO COMPETE.
