BUYS FINE HORSES IN GRANDE RONDE

Argentina Has Two Kinds of Money

Dr. De la Plaza Has Scheme for Putting Paper Money On More Stable Basis But It Is Unpopular.

Buenos Aires, Jan. 25.—(By Mail)—The plan suggested by Dr. De la Plaza, just retired as president of Argentina, for putting the republic on a "one money" basis has not met with a very enthusiastic public reception.

Some time ago the Argentines grew tired of transacting business in a depreciated and fluctuating paper currency. They accordingly took an accounting and found that they had enough gold on hand to redeem their outstanding paper issues at the rate of 44 cents on the dollar.

A law was accordingly passed fixing 44 centavos as the legal value of a paper peso. A gold peso was worth 100 centavos, or the merest trifle less than \$1 United States money. Gold pesos were and still are so scarce, however, as to be practical curiosities. The gold to redeem the 44-centavo paper pesos was religiously kept at the Caja de Conversion, however, and whenever any more paper money was issued, a corresponding amount of gold was deposited in the caja.

The result of this was to stop the

fluctuation of Argentine money but it left the country with two kinds of pesos, at least nominally, gold and paper. It complicated book-keeping and caused more other incidental inconveniences.

Just before his term as president expired, Dr. De la Plaza sent a message to congress saying he considered this a poor arrangement. He proposed that, as the 44 centavos paper pesos were out and were presented for redemption, in a volume sufficiently smaller to allow the gold reserve still to cover it.

There were other incidental features to his plan, concerning coinage and various minor details but, essentially, the scheme was to end the system of having two varieties of the same kind of money.

The public view is that this would be a good thing in theory but that it would cause more temporary inconvenience and confusion than the country likes to submit to. Furthermore it is asserted that the change would unsettle prices for a long time and that the consumer would get the worst of it.

Congress has the matter still under consideration but the plan has so many opponents that its adoption seems doubtful.

Mrs. Deal Granted Divorce.

Mrs. Carrie Deal last night was granted a divorce from Robert Deal by Circuit Judge Knowles. Mrs. Deal was given custody of the three children, \$30 a month alimony and \$300 additional alimony to be gained from realizing on the household furniture.



American Business Must Pool Interests to Meet Foreign Competition After the War

THE government of the United States must look to the protection of its industries, its manufacturers and its workmen if it is to avoid being outrun in the commercial race after the war.

If we are to give in this country an eight hour day we have got to give the manufacturer and the workman some sort of scientific protection against the countries where the LABORERS WORK TEN AND TWELVE HOURS AND WHERE WOMEN ARE SO LARGELY EMPLOYED.

If there are to be peace and prosperity in this country after the great cataclysm in Europe has ended manufacturers and exporters must be allowed to reduce their expenses by pooling their interests in the campaign for foreign markets. This must be done to meet the situation presented by the combination of buying interests in Germany and other countries.

AS AN EXAMPLE, THE PRICE PAID FOR AMERICAN COPPER VIRTUALLY IS FIXED BY FRANKFORT OR BY LONDON OR BY THE TWO TOGETHER.

Combinations exist in other countries through which products are purchased practically for the whole nation, and they are enabled to go into American markets and buy from separate producers, who are competing against each other in low prices instead of combining to insure a reasonable return for their product.

There must be combinations among the exporters to give protection to the farmer and the producer of the raw material, else the raw material can be bought here for extremely low prices, manufactured abroad and sold in all the markets of the world at a price at which American manufacturers can hardly compete.
