Who Will Be President On Fourth of March?

A Nation Without an Executive or a Congress Is Predicted But We Hazard a Guess That We Will Survive the Shock.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 26.—(United Press)—A nation without an executive, and without a legislative body, is what this United States may be March 4 unless constitutional sharks trying to prevent it, succeed.

Sunday, March 4, is the death-day of the 64th congress and of President Wilson's first term.

Three precedents are found in American history—in 1821, 1849 and 1877—for adjourning congress on March 3d at noon, as Sunday fell on the 4th. No precedent is found for continuing its sessions until the 5th.

A resolution introduced by Senator Walsh, of Montana, declares it is the sense of the senate that the present session expire on March 4, at noon. It has been referred to the senate judiciary committee.

No decision has yet been reached as to when President Wilson and Vice-President Marshall will take their oaths of office. Either could, if necessary, take it the third, or again, be sworn in on Sunday the 4th, and then again on Monday, as a "guarantee" against fault in doing it Sunday.

Constitutional experts say the oath administered on Sunday would be completely legal and binding.

Oregon Man is Head of Department U. of W.

Colin V. Dymont Is Friend and Teacher to Many Eastern Oregon Men and Women.

Colin V. Dymont, associate professor of journalism in the University of Oregon, has been appointed professor of journalism and administrative head of the department of journalism in the University of Washington, Seattle, effective February 1. He succeeds Lee A. White, acting head of the department, who has accepted an executive post on a large eastern newspaper. Mr. White has acted as head since the departure of Frank Kane last June, to become advertising manager for the Packard Motorcar company, Detroit.

The new head is a Scotch Canadian and an honor graduate of the University of Toronto. After taking his degree in classics in 1900 he went to Spokane, Wash., passing through the early land boom days of the northwest in the service of Washington papers, notably the Spokane Spokesman-Review. For the Spokesman-Review he covered Eastern Oregon and Washington. He handled the Heppner flood story for the Spokane paper. In 1904 he went to Portland, Ore., and until 1913 worked in many editorial capacities on the Portland Telegram and the Oregon Daily Journal. In 1913 he was invited to join the faculty in journalism at the University of Oregon, where the department was then one year old.

By many Eastern Oregon students Professor Dymont is loved as teacher, friend, comrade and athletic coach.

Merle Thorpe, until recently head of the department of journalism in the University of Kansas and now editor of the Nation's Business, Washington, was first head of the University of Washington department, which is one of the oldest and in enrollment one of the largest two in the United States. It has a faculty of five, conducts a central advertising bureau for newspaper men of the state and prints the University of Washington Daily in its own plant.

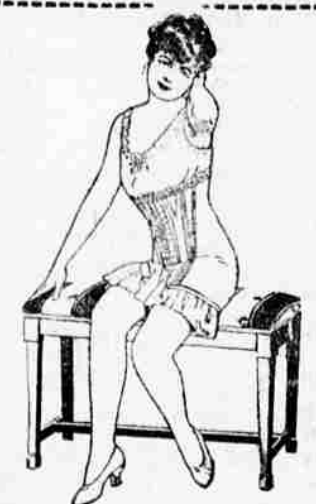
