Marine Corps Station Here by February 1

Captain Lovick P. Pinkston, Retired, Was in City Yesterday to Complete Arrangements.

A recruiting station of the United States marine corps will be established in La Grande by February 1. This announcement was made in the city yesterday by Captain Lovick P. Pinkston, United States marine corps, retired, in charge of recruiting in the Portland district, Montana, Idaho, Eastern Washington and Oregon.

The office of the recruiting station will be in room 222, Postoffice building. The Silver Grill will feed the recruits accepted until they are sent to the marine recruiting barracks at Mare Island, California; the Imperial hotel will furnish beds, and Dr. M. K. Hall will act as examining surgeon.

Captain Pinkston has not definitely decided who will be in charge of the La Grande office but it probably will be Sergeant M. B. Young, now in charge of the Pendleton station. Four stations, at Missoula, Helena and Butte, Montana, and La Grande, are about to be established and the four following men will have their choice of places: Sergeant Young, Pendleton; Sergeant Charles E. Rice, Spokane; and Sergeants William B. Hamner and James E. Brooks, attached to the Portland office.

Captain Pinkston is the originator of the marine corps publicity bureau, with offices in New York City. The bureau supplies the press of the country with well written articles on the marine corps.
