Sheriff's Office Now Engaged in  
Making List—Probably Less Than  
Last Year.

If you haven't paid your 1915 taxes you had better take some means to do so within the week as property on which 1915 taxes are unpaid will be advertised for sale by the sheriff, beginning next Monday, February 5. Property may be redeemed by the owner after being put on the delinquent list, or even after it has been sold, but the expense of advertising, of the sheriff's clerical work and posting of notices, and other charges, and interest on the taxes, must then be paid. So it is truly catching time by the forelock to pay your 1915 taxes before next Monday.

The sheriff's office started on the delinquent list this morning and will probably finish by the middle of the week. No one in the office would hazard a guess as to the number of pieces of property which may be advertised for sale but the general belief is that the list this year will be smaller than usual.
