#### Sells Wheat for \$75,000

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 30.—(United Press)—Thomas F. Wren of Spokane, director of the Old National bank and the Union Trust company, has just sold 55,000 bushels of wheat for approximately \$75,000. He averaged \$1.55 a bushel for the entire lot, which was sold in bulk, making the net price even better than the figures indicate, as there will be no expense for sacks.

The grain was grown on his 2800-acre ranch on Camas prairie, near Penn, Idaho. Four buying concerns, including the Miller Milling company of Moscow, secured portions of the crop.

Charity forbids me to say that quite a number went out in the kitchen and had "more," after the formal dinner was over. You see I learned something about charity last night. And with the "drinks" I should mention some pretty fine concoction that had "Silverthorn's" label on it.
